Miss Parrott followed with a most interesting discussion on mental suggestion, taking first, the suggestion of the teacher to the pupils and second, the teacher's suggestion to herself. She closed with several helpful aphorisms.

The citizen and the school was the subject of an address by Mr. Springer of Culver. Among other good things he said that our civilization is founded on the intellectual development of its citizenship. It is important that parents should be educated, said the speaker, but infinitely more important that the teachers should be educated because it is they who mold largely the character of our boys and girls.

The institute closed, after a profitable session, by an excellent paper on the "School and the Home" by Superintendent Ford.
