

County Court

May Term

The regular May term of the Commissioners' Court convened at 10 a. m., May 4, 1910. Present—H. C. Ellis, Judge; and Commissioners Rice and Harley.

Upon petition of eleven electors residing within the limits of the proposed Lava Voting Precinct No. 26, alleging 25 voters and believing said precinct should be created, it is ordered that the following constitute the boundaries of said Lava Precinct voting precinct to wit: Beginning at the northeast corner of township 20, R. 14 E., W. 1/2, thence west on township line to section corner between 22 and 23 in township 19 S., R. 11 E., thence north on said section line between 22 and 23 to a section corner of section 22 and 23; thence west on section line to corner 20 and 21, and 20 and 22; thence south to township corners of 19 and 20, ranges 10 and 11; thence west on township line to county line thence south on county line to township corners between 20 and 21, thence east on township line between 20 and 21 to range line between 14 and 15 east; thence north on said range line to place of beginning, all in Crook county, state of Oregon. It is further ordered that the school house near the John Atkinson ranch be designated as the voting place.

A recent patent describes a new form of wave motor in which the power of the waves of the sea or ocean is utilized alternately with the power of gravity to operate an air compressor. The compressed air is stored in a reservoir and may be piped to any point desired, so that the energy of the waves may be utilized at a considerable distance from the ocean.

A thrill of apprehension will be felt by millions who see it they head plying through the stars and its sword shaped tail brandished over the earth, as if monitory of unknown and unavoidable evil.

Astronomers have calculated that Halley's comet must have crossed inside the orbital distance of Jupiter from the sun about the 1st of last January. In the middle of January its distance from the earth was estimated at 440,000,000 miles. During the late fall it is expected to become visible to the naked eye after having for months before been photographed and studied with telescopes. It will slowly brighten during next winter, being visible from nearly all parts of the earth.

Just what his appearance will be no one can predict. It is the Proteus of space. It may blaze with amazing splendor, as it did when trembling Europe saw it in an avatar of the conquering sword of the prophet of Mecca, or it may be relatively insignificant, but in any event it will fix the attention of mankind and for astronomers will be the most interesting phenomenon seen in the sky for many decades.

Interesting Discovery in Pompeii. A discovery of great interest was made not very long ago at Pompeii, where the excavation work is being steadily carried on. Under the ash deposits there was found an extensive villa of handsome construction and ornamented with very fine frescoes. The villa contains statues and other works of sculpture, both Greek and Roman, besides very rich furniture, which is well ornamented, and also many vases of different kinds.

Automatic Field Gun. The McClean-Lissak automatic gun, which has been sent to Canada by the British government, is a remarkable weapon. It is mounted on an automobile truck, and with a supply of ammunition and a crew of ten men it will travel at a rate of twenty-five miles an hour and is at all times ready to wheel into position and fire. It will hurl three pound shells a distance of three miles and a half at a rate of 200 per minute. This fusillade can be delivered after a stop in half the time it takes up to unlimber the ordinary artillery.

Polishing With Air Blast. The sand blast as a polisher is now followed by the simple air blast. The erosive power, of course, is not so great, but when the articles to be cleaned or finished are placed in a basket in a rapidly driven centrifugal machine and hot air is blown from a pipe through the basket a high polish is imparted rapidly and efficiently. Tarnished nickel or silver and objects not requiring deep cutting are given a brilliant new surface.

Census of the Chinese. Under the provisions of the program of administrative reform in preparation for constitutional government the ministry of the interior of the Chinese empire has issued regulations governing the taking of a census of all Chinese, both at home and abroad. There will be a census of families and also of individuals. The former is to be completed in 1910 and the latter not later than 1912.

Ordinance No. 173.

An ordinance to regulate the speed of automobiles and motor cycles within the city limits and for lighting of lamps on same. Section 1. Every person running an automobile or motor cycle within the city of Prineville at a greater speed than 8 miles per mile shall be guilty of violating this ordinance, and upon conviction before the Recorder's Court shall be fined not less than ten dollars (\$10) and not more than fifty dollars (\$50), and in default of payment of such fine and the cost of prosecution such person shall, by order of said court, be confined in the city jail, one day for each two dollars of such fine.

CLEANING SCHOOLBOOKS.

Ingenious Disinfecting Device Removes Disease Germs.

The fact that sanitary experts and physicians prove that many diseases are spread by germs conveyed from hand to hand in schoolbooks has led to this remarkable and ingenious disinfecting and cleaning plant in France, says Popular Mechanics. It consists of a machine which sucks all the dust from the leaves and lathes them in a disinfectant and a great drier in which they are subjected to hot air.

books and sucks the dust from them. It also passes them through the long funnel-like device in which they are given the disinfectant bath. After this treatment the books are placed on racks in the drier and left there until the hot air effectually accomplishes its work.

Tree Planting in Massachusetts.

Every one who admires the stately trees of the old New England towns—and who does not—will be gratified to know that tree planting is being carried on systematically in the Massachusetts woods. The report of E. W. Wood, forester of the state highway commission, shows that during the year ended Nov. 30, 1908, 1,524 new trees were planted and 744 old trees were replaced. During the preceding five years 15,113 trees had been eliminated among fifty-five towns. The cost in 1908 of new trees averaged \$1.20 each, and the average cost of maintenance was 20 cents per tree.

The Earth's Light.

The light intensity of the moonlight sky is estimated by E. J. Lawrence at 0.001 of a candle foot of moonlight at a distance of 240,000 miles from the earth. The intensity of moonlight is 100 times greater than that of starlight.

HALLEY'S COMET COMING.

Stellar Wanderer Will Be Visible Early in the Winter. The biggest tree show that this generation will have seen will soon be given. Its arena will be high up in the sky, where everybody may see it, and there will be no need of crowding. Professor Garrett P. Service, noted as a writer on popular astronomy, tells all about it in Huntington's Signposts. It will be a one-act show, the return of Halley's comet. The last time it was seen by the people on earth was in 1835, and it is now in the last stages
