No Standing Still. Aggressive merchants everywhere are alive to the fact that no store can grow in favor if instead of constantly seeking progress it stands still and relies upon the reputation it has acquired.

Some merchants, however, seem to be of the opinion that being so well known, having so good a standing in the community, people are practically obliged to come to them. Others appear to think that if every now and then they offer "stupendous values" and give the public sensational bargains they can create so great and lasting an impression that people will overlook their shortcomings, such as inattentive or discourteous service, unreliable merchandise, etc., and notwithstanding that such shortcomings seem to be increasing instead of decreasing will give them the bulk of their trade. Such merchants evidently forget the well known axiom that most people have short memories for favors extended to them.

Every merchant if he wishes his business to continue growing must constantly make whatever improvements and innovations are needed for the comfort and convenience of his customers and must from time to time introduce such features as are calculated to make his store more attractive. He will not be wrong if he regards such methods as a form of insurance just as necessary to his peace of mind and progress as other means of protection which long ago came to be regarded as essential.

Health and Cleanliness. If every individual in a town appreciated the fact that he is to some extent responsible for the condition of the public health and in order to keep his conscience clear would keep his own back yard, cellar, alley and street in good condition, the reports of the commissioner of health would show the result of the multiplied effort in a still greater decrease in the death rate. Disregard of the laws of health arises not so much from antagonistic views in relation to proper sanitary measures as from the tendency to undervalue the homely little facts and little opportunities of everyday life.
