The Oregon Agricultural college, which will celebrate its quarter centennial June 14, is located at Corvallis, on the Willamette river and in the heart of the beautiful Willamette valley.

The college grounds, consisting of 250 acres, are located within the western limits of the city. The campus proper, covering about forty acres, is beautifully decorated with magnificent specimen trees, flower beds and groups of shrubbery.

In place of the single brick building which housed the college in 1883 and which now serves as the administration building there are twenty structures, many of which eclipse in every way the original college home.
