The Pioneer Cream Company turned out 50 gallons of ice cream one day last week. The daily output of the plant is about 30 gallons. A ten-gallon power freezer has been installed and a power ice crusher is being put into place for the summer run.

Barney's new sawmill, situated on Mill creek, began operations Monday morning with a full crew of men. The plant has a minimum capacity of 10,000 feet and a maximum output of 15,000 feet, the total of which will perhaps be used by Shipp & Perry of this place.

Mail contracts have been let by the postoffice department for the coming four years, over five of the lines running out of Prineville. G. M. Cornett secured the contract on the Prineville-Shaniko road at a price little less than \$10,000 per annum. Prineville-Silver Lake and Prineville-Burns contracts were also awarded to Mr. Cornett, while John Hunsaker got the Prineville-Sisters line, the contract price being \$2600. S. R. Cooper was awarded the contract on the Prineville-Howard line.

A. T. Morris came over from Lebanon last week on a visit to relatives in Prineville.

R. C. Hartley and wife of Sumpter, Oregon, a brother-in-law of Edgar Stewart, arrived in Prineville Tuesday for a short visit.

Ship & Perry are to build a bungalow for James Wright. The new bungalow will be built on lots east of the high school buildings. It will be 24x36 feet and will cost about \$2000, although the exact price is not given out.

The Powell Butte cemetery was dedicated Sunday with appropriate exercises which were conducted by Rev. W. S. Cooke. A large crowd gathered for the services, and the five graves, which the little enclosure contains, were fittingly decorated. The little cemetery is situated on the farm of Wm. Pancake, contains one acre of ground which has been cleared and fenced.

Charles Wolfer discovered a strong flow of water at thirteen feet on his ranch near Powell Butte a short time ago. Mr. Wolfer and his neighbors have been hauling water for years, a distance of several miles, and the discovery of water in abundance so near the surface is a great convenience to them. His place is near the Shepherd schoolhouse.

George Rodman and Waite Bros, both of Lamonta, have each bought a small-sized combined harvester and will have them in operation this fall when grain is ready to harvest. The machines have a capacity of 25 acres a day each and are operated by three men and drawn by fourteen horses. Waite Bros. will cut 700 acres of wheat on C. F. Smith's farm and George Rodman will harvest his own grain and that of some of his neighbors.

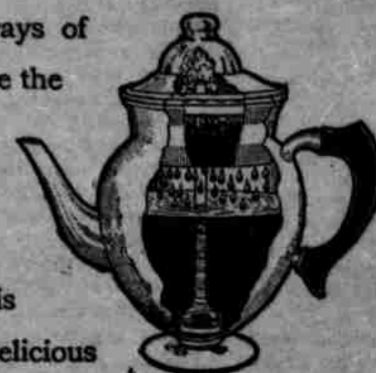
