TUBERCULOSIS SANITARIUMS.

United States Leads In Fight Against Consumption.

In Germany there are ninety-nine public sanitariums for adult consumptives with 10,539 beds, besides thirtysix private sanitariums with 2,175 beds. In eighteen sanitariums for children with tuberculosis there are \$37 beds, a total of less than 14,000 beds. The United States has prov ed over 300 sanitariums with over 15,000 beds, showing that this country is in the lead in the anti-tuberculosis war. France has only twelve sanitariums for adult consumptives, with a total capacity of 148 beds. All of these institutions are private except bar. 

DROP-CHISEL MACHINE.

Device Facilitates the Excavation of Frozen Ground.

A machine for excavating frozen earth was introduced in Winnipeg. success In sewer trenching and foundation work. In that city the frost penetrates to a depth of from five to six and a half feet, and previous to the introduction of the machine all earth exeavation during the winter months had to be done by hand picking or by blasting.
