### Two New Additions to Prineville

Prineville is to have two new additions as soon as the surveying and platting can be done. J. W. Boone bought a 160-acre tract of J. O. Powell the first of the week, and will plat the west forty which will reach to within two blocks of the water tank of the P. L. & W. Co., on the heights north of the city, and from there will lay to the east.

As soon as the demand justifies, more of this tract will be platted. The land will be supplied with water mains, etc., by the water company as soon as there is a demand by the purchasers.

A. W. Grater is platting his twenty-five acre tract northeast of the city, and has made an advance sale of fourteen lots. He has applications for ten more. This addition will be known as Grater's Addition. The survey is well along and will be completed this week. This land and the tract bought by J. W. Boone will be sold by the Henderson Investment Company. Sales will begin as soon as the surveys have been completed on both of them.

The demand for town property is increasing and people from outside points have been writing and inquiring about vacant lots in Prineville. The supply has been far less than the demand for some time.

### Blooded Stock Will Stay Here

Six more English Shire horses from the Haycreek ranch were bought by local men the first of the week. R. M. Powell bought yearling mares that are as large as many of the mature draft horses in this country, paying \$400 each for them. M. R. Biggs bought two young mares also, paying \$800 for the span and a span of six-year-old mares at \$1500 for the two.

These are of the same stock and general type of the mares bought a few weeks ago by H. E. Rideout, who paid \$1500 for two, one of which now has a colt which Mr. Rideout values at \$1000.

The horse Standard, which was purchased by a company of Prineville men some time ago, comes from the same farm and gives Prineville and the immediate vicinity practically all of the English Shire horses formerly owned by these people. Two of the mares went to Idaho, and one or two to other parties. They are all registered.

#### John Ray Dead.

John Ray, who was the victim of an accident in Portland several weeks ago, died from his injuries June 5, aged 76 years and 8 months. Mr. Ray was born in Ohio and came to Oregon in the early days. He crossed the plains with other emigrants and settled in the Willamette valley, near Scio, where he lived until the last six years, which were spent in Crook county with his son George. His remains were taken to Scio, where he was laid to rest beside his wife and son. He was a kind and loving husband and father, and leaves many relatives and friends to mourn his loss.

### Harriman Officials Coming Here

J. P. O'Brien, vice-president and general manager of the O. R. & N. Co., and R. B. Miller, traffic manager of the same line, left Portland last night in a private car for Condon, and will arrive in Prineville sometime during the next few days in automobiles.

Mr. O'Brien does not attach much importance to his trip and says that it does not mean anything in the way of railroad building, but the fact that he is to cover the same route led by the Hill party recently, and the territory that will soon be tapped by both Hill and Harriman roads, leads the people to think that it is an important trip.

The trip will lead from Condon to Mayville, thence to Prineville and over the stage road to Burns. From there the party may cross the state to Lakeview and thence north down the Deschutes and to The Dalles. The Commercial Club will entertain the party during their stay in Prineville.

### Is Your Name Written There

The registration books are open for the registering of voters for the November election. They were opened on June 7, and to date there has been very few voters enrolled. Deputy Sheriff John Combs was the first voter to place his name on the roll, with J. H. Hamer second.

It is important that every voter register, and all should register early, for the secretary of state mails literature to all who enroll, explaining the various measures that are to be voted upon.

All voters not native born should bring naturalization papers, as they will be required by the clerk at the time of registration.

There were 1827 voters registered for the election in 1908, but the number will be much greater this year.

#### Serious Accident at Bend.

A dispatch from Bend says: A few days ago, while Emil Erickson and Oliver Johnson were driving into Bend the neck strap, holding the neekyoke of their buggy, broke. The horses became frightened and started to run. Erickson jumped from the vehicle and suffered injuries from which he cannot recover. He was taken to the Bend hospital, where his wounds were dressed. On the left side of his head is a fracture four inches long, and he has other serious injuries about the head. Erickson is about 47 years of age and has been a hardworking man having acquired considerable property in and around Bend. He has one brother, Ole Erickson, who resides here.

### An Undeveloped Empire in Extent

Mr. Davidson and Mr. Mosher of the Land Grant Company, gave the Oregonian of June 14, a very important interview that shows plainly the extent of the undeveloped empire in Central Oregon. It is in part as follows:

"The inspection has been a revelation," said Curtis L. Mosher. "The lands owned by the company are an empire in themselves, capable of supporting hundreds of thousands of people in prosperity. The company owns irrigable, dry farming, alfalfa, fruit, grazing and timber lands, with the possibility of mineral and oil on many sections and other minor resources."

#### Colonization to Begin Soon.

"The general results of the trip seem to indicate that the feasible plan of colonization will be to handle the Malheur Valley, Harney Valley, Crooked River Valley and the timber as separate units, grouping in each unit the scattered holdings which are adjacent and most easily reached. Railway development will be a very important factor in deciding what definite plan of settlement will be followed. In the Harney Valley especially colonization will follow the railroad and can hardly be effectively handled as long as prospective purchasers of land are compelled to make stage journeys of 150 miles to inspect the road grant property, and are unable to see where certain agricultural products, notably cereals, can be successfully marketed without ruinous expense in the way of freighters' bills."

#### Timber Holdings Extensive.

"The timber holdings of the corporation cover the largest body of standing timber in America not yet transferred to the hands of mill men, timber companies or large holdings of standing timber. For the purpose of gaining more accurate knowledge as to present conditions in the timber belt, the commercial value and logging conditions, President Davidson dispatched Mr. Marvin from Ontario to Portland with instructions to confer with the local representatives of the old road grant company and make a hasty survey of the timber, reporting at Prineville."

"The great bulk of the Buck Mountain timber, embracing 73,000,000 feet of yellow pine, will find a ready market in the Harney and Crooked River Valleys, from both of which it is readily accessible. Of the Ochoco and Horse Heaven timber, embracing 175,000,000 feet of yellow pine, practically all is of fine quality, with excellent logging conditions. It can be milled at Prineville and there is a possibility that unless a deal is made for the transfer of this body of timber the company will saw it for the local markets."

"The timber on the east slope of the Cascades, consisting of 800,000,000 feet of choice yellow pine, will be readily accessible to the extension of the Oregon Trunk Line and is of a very superior quality, comparing favorably with any standing timber in the Pacific Northwest. Representative orchards and gardens tracts were photographed and special attention was devoted to dry farm tracts and their crops."

"The whole territory needs better farming and needs it badly and is replete with absolutely undeveloped possibilities," said Mr. Mosher. "A thousand settlers in any of the districts we have seen will completely revolutionize production and establish beyond doubt the possibility of successfully growing crops which have so far not even been experimented with. The Crooked River Valley, as an example, offers tremendous possibilities to the man who will test its fruit production and do it with the right experience and skill. Mr. Geer, of Burns, has successfully established a dry farm orchard."

### Peace Hovers Over Railroads

Carrying out the terms of the compromise agreement signed recently, all litigation pending between the Oregon Trunk Line and the Deschutes Railroad Company has been wiped out in the United States court. Through this procedure the controversies as to rights of way through Deschutes Canyon are adjusted, and the two roads will proceed with the laying of rails on either side of the Deschutes river, with the exception of 12 miles opposite the Warm Springs Reservation, where the same line will be used. The same tracks will also be used by both roads from the north side of Crooked river to Redmond.

Three cases were disposed of by the stipulation, one of them being the 12 mile conflict opposite the reservation, which was argued at

length and had been under consideration by the court. The Sherman County right-of-way case, which was transferred to the United States Court, is also disposed of, as is the claim made by both companies on the east side of the canyon for 50 miles south of the Columbia river.

The advent of the dove of peace is only among the construction camps, for the white bird will have nothing to do with competition for business in most of Central Oregon, each company reserving the right to conduct distinct departments, which will reach out for business as eagerly as though the fight for track room was at its height. The compromise affects only the laying of rails in the two districts, and there, it is under tool, joint agencies will be established—Oregonian.
