Some Good Crook County Ranches

One mile east of the Hillman townsite is the west boundary line of the 160 acre farm of W. A. Stevens who came to Central Oregon from Colorado three years ago. Mr. Stevens is a fruit man and is planting his entire tract to apple trees as fast as he can prepare the land and get the trees out. Three years ago the clearing commenced and that fall 1200 apple trees, mostly Jonathans, were planted. There were also some cherries and 1 runes put out, besides a quantity of berry stuff and garden produce. The place is irrigated from the D. I. & P. ditch. The results obtained from the deep sandy soil, warm water and continuous sunshine are highly gratifying.

Mr. Stevens got 2000 apple grafts a year ago and these will be ready for planting next spring. He says this is a fruit country, and is backing up his judgment with his time and money.

Bordering the Hillman townsite on the west and southwest, also on the south are some of the finest farms to be found anywhere.

Here the Journal man visited the ranches of O. D. Hall, who has a 40, Ralph and Claude McCauley, who owns an 80 each, Willfred Archer, who has a 40 of ditch land and a homestead, and E. B. Nichols who has a homestead, and many others.

A most careful examination was made of the Archer farm.

Mr. Archer was among the very first that settled in this part of the segregation. He bought a forty of ditch land five years ago. There was no canal, and no wagon roads.

The largest part of the forty is coming to its own this year in red clover. The yield is excellent. The first cutting was a little over three tons to the acre, and the second, which was irrigated to better advantage, yielded approximately four tons to the acre, the water is being applied for the third cutting now. Some of the hay has

been sold for \$18 per ton, and the entire crop is of as good quality as could be grown on any land. It has a length of three feet and grows thick on the ground. Mr. Archer's place is half a mile from Nelson Brother's railroad camp and less than a mile from Hillman.

Berries of all kinds and garden produce are grown successfully on all of these places, and fruit trees on the McCauley place this year are bearing. Mr. Archer has a reservoir where ice is harvested and the neighborhood is supplied from his spacious icehouse.

A single rose bush on the Archer place is blooming yet after a busy summer producing crimson blossoms, and beauty and fragrance of the blooms will rival any plant of the Rose City.

What can be said of the Archer place is true in a general way of all in the district, and the same general conditions exist along the entire distance of seven miles south to the Hub City.

MACHINE TREE FELLER.

New Power Saw That Has a Wide Range of Usefulness.

In the lumbering industry hand and hand saws have had a limited use owing to the difficulty of making use of them in the forests, but an improvement has been recently made in the shape of a power driven saw which answers all the requirements of service in the forest and represents a great saving of time, material and labor in the felling of large trees. The invention is that of R. L. Muir, an authority on forestry of the Pacific coast.

The new machine is a small and compact and not heavy apparatus, which can be moved with little difficulty along the edge of a forest or even into the forest itself where the foliage is not too dense. The power is supplied by a gasoline engine, or, where the electric current is available, a motor may be used. The engine is mounted on four broad wheels. There is an extending frame around which passes a chain of saw teeth links, the frame being stiff and rigid in order to keep the saw in perfect line and yet capable of adjustment so that it may be operated at any desired height or position within reasonable limits, either horizontal, vertical or at any angle.

This saw has been put to a severe test in the forests of California, where it is said to have been an undoubted success. It has a wide range of usefulness, cutting down standing timber as well as cutting up timber lying on the ground. A trunk which measured from five to seven feet in diameter was cut in ten minutes, a work which would have taken two men with a hand saw an hour and a half to accomplish.

But three men are required to operate the machine, and it is said to take the place of twenty-five to thirty sawyers.—Omaha World Herald.

Chinese Fond of Scientific Devices.

In regard to the male possibilities in China for optical devices Vice Consul C. L. L. Williams of Newchwang says that ingenious devices appeal to the people of that country. The wealthy Chinese is extremely fond of mechanical instruments and will frequently be seen carrying two or more watches and wearing foreign glasses. He is well known for his fondness for clocks, telescopes, fieldglasses—in fact, almost any scientific instrument.—Consular Report.

Peat For Locomotives.

The Suedes are experimenting in the use of peat fuel for the state railways. Their experts claim that a mixture of equal parts of peat and coal by weight, or two baskets of peat to one of coal, gives the best results. The price of coal is twice that of peat, and a considerable saving in cost of fuel is effected. No change of the locomotive furnaces has been found necessary, and it is also claimed that the grates can be more easily kept clean than with coal.
