Circuit court will open for the regular fall term on Monday, October 17. There will be many civil cases and a number of criminal cases.

The case of the State of Oregon against Dan Karough, who is being held in the county jail for the murder of his foreman in the railway construction camp near Madras at midnight on July 16, is the only case to date where a man's life is at stake. In this case there is much circumstantial evidence, and some direct evidence, but as most of the witnesses are Karough's own countrymen it is a question as to what will be brought out in the trial.

The matter of the conviction of C. H. Erickson and his wife, Bettie Erickson in this court a year ago, which was confirmed by the supreme court of the state during September this year, will be re-sentenced to serve one year each in the penitentiary.

The case of State of Oregon against C. Sam Smith is on the

docket and will be taken up at this time. This case is referred back to the district court for a rehearing from the supreme court of the state on technicalities.

There is considerable speculation as to what action the grand jury will take in the matter of the illegal sale of liquor and the bawdy house cases in different parts of the county. There are nine women who were bound over by Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Duffy at Madras last week, to appear before the grand jury, and it is said that there are thirty more in the county who will furnish material for consideration by that body. Those who know state that there are at least 100 men in the county who are guilty of the illegal sale of liquor, and if these come up for trial a lengthy and sensational term will be the result.

Railway Garbage Car.
Chicago is trying a new car designed to remove city garbage over the street railways at night. The car is of steel construction, thirty-four feet long, divided into three sections which are so shaped that they can be dumped with a pole by a single man, thus doing away with the necessity of using air cylinders or other mechanical dumping apparatus. The sections are made water tight, so that there will be no leakage of wet garbage. The car is not provided with motors. It is intended to use the car in the daytime for hauling concrete and construction materials.

The D. I. & P. Co. Commended

Recognizing the danger that the State Land Board may cancel the contracts under which the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company, is operating in Crook County and commending the trustee of the first mortgage bond holder for attempting to save the property, Judge Bean refused to allow A. S. Howard, Jr., to intervene in the litigation, by which the affairs of the old company are being concluded in the United States court. Howard is the owner of \$25,000 of the first mortgage bonds, but was not a party to the suit brought by bondholders of Columbus, O., who received \$350,000 of the first issue.

While the suit was pending, the State Land Board served notice unless a showing was made to convince them that the company was able to build the ditches and irrigate the 214,911 acres of arid land, it would recall the contracts. The land is held under the Carey act, by which it is given to the state, and by the latter sold to persons who are able to build the works.

The court characterized the plans of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company as a great public enterprise in which large numbers of settlers and much taxable property were concerned. Judge Bean could not see the equity of allowing the representative of less than three per cent of the indebtedness, to tie up the proceedings and endanger the stability of the whole enterprise.

The Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company is now the representative of three Carey act irrigation projects in Crook county. On its own account it undertook to build canals and irrigate 74,198 acres, and by assignment secured adjoining property of the Pilot Butte Company amounting to 84,797 acres, and the Oregon Irrigation Company of 56,006 acres. As water has become available, 49,000 acres have been sold to settlers, largely on the installment plan.

In March of this year representatives of the bonded indebtedness asked for a receiver, alleging that the interest on their bonds had not been paid, and that the company had failed to maintain a sinking fund for the redemption of the bonds. Mismanagement in many particulars was alleged, and in April a receiver was appointed by the court.

In an interview Roscoe Howard said:

"At various times during the progress of this case my associates and myself have been charged with fraud and mismanagement in our affairs connected with the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company. We have borne these attacks patiently without replying, knowing that we have been guilty of no dereliction of duty and that upon the final adjudication our course would be sustained, as well as would that of the Merchants Saving & Trust Company, trustee.

"This has been done completely in Judge Bean's decision of October 3. I speak for my associates in the Howard Contract Company, F. S. Stanley, A. F. Biles, R. J. Bulkley and D. N. Hartt, in stating that we are much gratified with the result. To avoid confusion of names I wish it clearly understood that R. S. Howard, Jr., receiver of the Title Guarantee & Trust Company, is no connection of mine."

Teachers' Institute Commences Oct. 19

The annual teachers' institute for Crook county will be held at the Crook County High School building in Prineville by Superintendent Ford, beginning Wednesday, October 19, and continuing three days. This should be, and no doubt will be the best institute yet held in the county. The school law makes it compulsory for every teacher in the county to attend.

No school can be held legally during those three days and as there are more instructors than ever before, the banner institute is looked forward to by the teachers in general.

Wednesday evening the instructors will be entertained at the home of Mrs. C. W. Elkins, and the night meeting Thursday will be held in the Presbyterian church, and Friday in the Methodist church.

Friday will be the big day for the school people at the fair. The school parade will come at 9:30 and the track meet will commence an hour later. At 2 o'clock the school children of Crook county will be addressed by President P. S. Campbell of the University of Oregon. School children will be admitted free to the grounds on school day. Every child of school age in the county should hear this address.

The inspection of the school exhibit will follow the address. It will commence at 3 p. m.

The Horses of Glacial Times.

A small, slender fluted horse roamed over Europe in glacial times and was hunted and sketched along with the mammoth, by the paleolithic dwellers in the British Isles. A curious method of reproducing the ancient animal has been adopted by Professor J. C. Ewart, the British naturalist. From the fossil remains available he has made a study of the species, which he has named Equus agilis, and has attempted to restore it by combining the essential characteristics as found in modern horses. His experiments have included the blending of seven different breeds—Connemara, Welsh, Hackney, Iceland, Hebridean, Shetland and Arab. He has succeeded in producing a number of small ponies of slight build and believes that they restore the horse of glacial times, not only in form, disposition and color, but in details of limbs and teeth. The ponies are yellow-dun in color, active and intelligent.

A Motor Street Cleaner.

A new street cleaning machine has been invented by an engineer in Vienna. It consists of a motorcar with a revolving brush which sweeps up the dust and throws it into a large funnel, from which it is sucked up by a ventilator and deposited in large metal boxes. The boxes can be removed when full and empty ones inserted with little trouble by the driver himself. The wagon is driven by a twenty-eight horsepower motor and will clean eleven miles of street an hour.

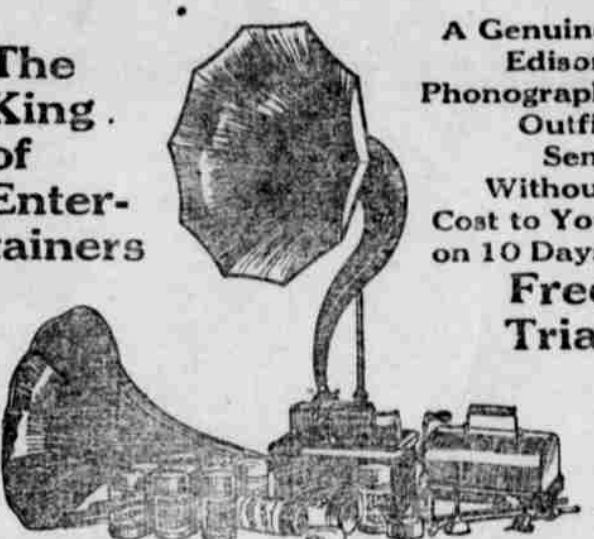
