will be given both to individuals and to commercial organizations. These include many ribbons and several cups that are prizes worth striving for.

School Day will be one of the biggest events at the fair. The parade of several hundred children to the grounds will be a sight worth coming many miles to see. In this event every school in the county is urged to participate. The different schools and individual children will meet at the Crook County High School building for the start at 9 a. m. on Friday, and the parade will arrive at the grounds in time for the school sports of the day.

One of the exhibits that will be made will no doubt attract much attention. A wagon load of corn will be on display from a field that produced many wagon loads this year.

Tillman Reuter, who took twelve first prizes, four second and two third prizes at the Dry Farming congress will have an exact duplicate of his display with a few added features at the county fair. There prizes were awarded Mr. Reuter at Spokane where he was competing with dry farming exhibits from all over the world, and the display of like products here will be an object lesson worth studying.

Superintendents of the different divisions are all busy getting ready to receive their displays and are decorating and preparing their parts of the pavilion.

Assistants on the grounds, ticket sellers and marshals have been arranged for, and all will be on hand Tuesday morning ready for business.

J. E. Roberts, president of the stockholders' board, is finishing up the needed improvements, one of which is the addition of a number of chicken pens for the use of the school children in their poultry exhibits.

It is not necessary for exhibitors to bring duplicate exhibits in competing for the Hill prizes. Any premium that is eligible for one may enter for both. If it should receive the regular prize this will in no way disqualify the same exhibit from receiving the Hill prize also.

The only qualification is that you state to the secretary or the

division superintendent in entering the exhibit that you wish to compete for the Hill prizes also.

School Day at the Fair

The first annual track meet for Crook county schools will be held at the fair grounds on Friday (School Day), with competition open to every team in the county.

At this contest there will be awarded two gold medals—one each for the best all around athlete in the junior and senior events. All school boys, fourteen years and under are in the junior events, and those fifteen and over will enter in the senior contests. These medals will be awarded to the athlete who takes the most points in all contests entered.

There are sixteen events—nine in the senior grade and seven in junior grade. All winners in these contests will be awarded a silver medal, and all taking second place will get bronze medals.

On Thursday will be the first basketball game ever played on an open court in the county. It will be a contest between the boys of the Alpha and Ochoconian societies of the Crook County High, and will be a fast game. The boys are training hard, and as the prize is a silver cup of considerable value a good game is sure to be the outcome.

The preparations for the school day events are about complete. The only change that may be made will be in the nature of added features.

Every teacher in the county will be present at the Institute, and at 9 a. m. on Friday, pupils from all the schools in the county are requested to present themselves at the High School building where their teacher will take charge of them and all will be supplied with a tag which will be sufficient for admittance to the fair ground without pay.

Students will form in parade at 9:30 and march to the fair ground arriving there at 10 a. m. The junior track meet will then take place in the following order:

First—50 yard dash.
Second—Ball throw.

Third—440 yard dash.
Fourth—Running high jump.
Fifth—220 yard dash.
Sixth—Running broad jump.
Seventh—100 yard dash.

Because of the large number of events, the senior sports will not be called until Saturday forenoon. They are as follows:

First—100 yard dash.
Second—Shot put.
Third—Half mile run.
Fourth—Running high jump.
Fifth—220 yard run.
Sixth—Base ball throw.
Seventh—Running broad jump.
Eighth—440 yard run.
Ninth—Hop, skip and jump.

Ordinance No. 177.

An ordinance vacating a part of First street, between "A" street and "D" street, in the City of Prineville, Oregon.

Whereas, It appears from the records of Crook county, State of Oregon, and the petition of more than ten freeholders of the City of Prineville, Oregon, filed herein, that First street in the City of Prineville, Crook county, State of Oregon, between A street and D street, according to what is commonly known as M. Hodges plat and survey of said town, was and is platted, surveyed and dedicated one hundred feet wide, and that other streets in said town and plat are platted, surveyed and dedicated eighty feet wide, and that it is unnecessary and inexpedient that said First street should be more than eighty feet wide, and that it is to the best interests of the City of Prineville, and its inhabitants that said First street between A street and D street should be vacated ten feet on each side thereof, therefore.

The people of the city of Prineville, Oregon, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That all that portion of First street, in the City of Prineville, Crook county, State of Oregon, according to M. Hodges plat, survey and dedication thereof, now on file and of record in the office of the County Clerk of Crook county, State of Oregon, and described as follows, to-wit: Commencing at the southeast corner of Block 3 of said town, according to said plat, survey and dedication, and running thence west along the north boundary of said First street to the southwest corner of Block 5 in said plat, survey and dedication; thence south ten feet; thence east to the west line of A street; thence north ten feet to the place of beginning; also commencing at a point ninety feet south of the southeast corner of said Block 3, and running west to a point ninety feet south of the southwest corner of said Block 5; thence south ten feet; thence east to the section line between Sections 5 and 6 in Township 15 south of Range 16 east of the Willamette Meridian in said county and state; thence north ten feet; thence west forty feet, more or less, to the place of beginning, Be, and the same is hereby vacated as a part of said street, highway and easement, and that portion of said street hereby vacated is hereby granted to the owners of the adjoining lots and tracts of land,

and annexed to the intersecting streets as their several interests may appear on record in the office of the County Clerk of Crook county, State of Oregon, at the time of the passage of this ordinance.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the mayor.

Read three times and passed the council September 13th, 1910.

CAR RETAINING DEVICE.

Mechanism Designed to Insure Safety on Railway Curves.

In order to insure the safety of cars when rounding curves and to prevent the car wheel flanges from having undue frictional engagement with the rails a safety mechanism has recently been invented which is pictured in the accompanying engraving. It consists of a central rail, A, that is supported on the ties and is strongly braced by means of anchoring devices, R, which are imbedded in the ground and terminate in plates C. The object of these plates is to prevent the anchoring devices from working upward.

The illustration shows a portion of a car truck passing over the rail A. The axles of the truck are connected by means of auxiliary trusses, D, below the main trusses, on which blocks, E, are supported. Designed to travel around these blocks E are endless chains, F, fitted with rollers. The rollers are pressed by the blocks E against the guide rail A. As the truck passes round a curve the rollers tend to keep it in place. Ordinarily the forward wheel on the outside of the curve tends to bear against the rail owing to the fact that it is rigidly connected with its mate on the other side of the curve, and hence it cannot travel faster than the latter. The result is that the flange on the outer wheel is subjected to considerable wear. The centering device here shown, however, will prevent the flange of the outer wheel from being unduly pressed against the rails. The guide rail serves to prevent spreading of the rails and keeps the cars from leaving the track. The inventor is Robert Belden of California.

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CIGAR AND CIGARETTE.

Smoker Gets More Nicotine From Former, Says Scientist.

Dr. Frank C. Kinney of Three Rivers, Mich., in a report to the State Medical society of his laboratory research into the effects of cigars and cigarettes says cigars are worse than cigarettes. Some of the things the doctor declares are:

One cigar yields as much crude nicotine as nine ordinary cigarettes.

A smoker gets 77 per cent of the total nicotine out of a cigar, 55 1/2 per cent out of a cigarette.

There is no opiate or "dope" in a cigarette.

The smoking of one cigar is equivalent to the smoking of about ten cigarettes in immediate succession.

Less nicotine is absorbed from a skinny cigar than from a fat one of the same strength and weight.

The doctor enters into a description of the methods of extracting nicotine from cigarettes and cigars and pictures with scientific detail the death of a six pound rat which was given four drops of "cigarette" nicotine and the severe illness of an eight pound cat which was given one drop.
