Busy Term of Court

Crook county is having the busiest term of court that has been recorded for many years. One hundred and 125 cases reached the docket of the trial court, and many have been weeded out in the grand jury rooms.

The grand jury has been returning indictments in bunches and yesterday morning there were twenty five or thirty, mostly liquor cases, in which true bills have been returned and will be tried unless some of the defendants plead guilty.

In the case against Dan Karan, who was on trial for murder, a verdict of guilty of murder in the second degree was brought in and Tuesday morning the defendant was sentenced to life imprisonment at Salem.

Victor DeWolf is held on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon and will be tried some time this week.

Floyd Whelpley and Lon Parrish are held, charged with illegal voting in the Prineville city elections, and will be tried as soon as their cases can be reached.
