Death of I. Michel.

I. Michel, who had been suffering from various complications of disease for several weeks, died at his home in this city Tuesday at 9:30 a. m. He was 53 years of age.

Some three months ago, Mr. Michel spent Sunday at the H. Gilson fruit ranch and after returning from the Sunday trip, complained of feeling sick. A doctor was called on Tuesday and the case was found to be critical. Mr. Michel was advised to leave the store and take medical treatment, which he did.

After several days he was considered almost beyond recovery. However, Dr. Edwards took him to Shaniko in his auto and from there he was taken by train to The Dalles Hospital, where he was much improved.

He returned to Prineville and took up his duties again at the store but was soon compelled to call medical aid and this time his ailment was pronounced typhoid, which was later complicated by bronchial ailments.

The body was shipped to Portland for burial, leaving Prineville yesterday morning.

B. R. Johnson, James Gilchrist and the nurse who has been attending Mr. Michel, accompanied the family.

Mr. Michel came to Prineville nine years ago for his wife's health. He engaged in business with his brother-in-law, Mr. Rieger, later J. E. Stewart bought Mr. Rieger's share of the business and a few years later Mr. Stewart bought Mr. Michel's interest. A short time afterward The Leader was opened, which has prospered from the start.

Mr. Michel was a member of the local Masonic order and has always been a man of influence and standing in the community. He leaves a widow and two sons, Sylvan and Arthur, aged twelve and fourteen respectfully.
