A KING'S DOWNFALL.

Louis Philippe's Lack of Nerve When the Crisis Came.

Baroness Bondo wrote in her diary the following account of the abdication of Louis Philippe of France on the day of that remarkable occurrence:

"An aide-de-camp of the minister of war who was in the king's cabinet when he abdicated gave me a detailed account of this most signal piece of cowardice. He had reviewed the troops in the carriage on horseback, highly roused, when a cry was raised, 'Vive le Roi! Vive le Roi!' No one had any orders; no one gave any. The mob rushed forward, shouting, 'Vive le Roi! Vive le Roi!' and shook hands with the outposts. The king retreated precipitately with his sons, and a subaltern of the national guard rushed into the palace asking to see him. He was admitted and in the greatest agitation said, 'Your majesty must abdicate.' 'Very well,' says the king. 'In favor of my grandson.' 'No, unconditionally,' says the young and self elected mouthpiece of public opinion.

"Would you believe it? Of all who were congregated round the royal personificator alone said: 'Go down and head your troops. Fight for your crown and your dynasty.' He was overruled, and they all marched out of the palace except the Duchesse d'Orleans, her children and the Due de Nemours."
