**Metolius Items.**

The pumping plant in the Metolius 900 foot well began operations Monday. It throws a stream of water four inches in diameter.

The drill bit which was stuck for a month in the new well at a depth of 250 feet was removed early this week. The bits were brought to the Prineville Machine shop for repairs. The bits are

thirteen inches in diameter and when fully equipped weighs over a ton each.

The work of grading streets and making other improvements in Metolius is going ahead rapidly. Track laying is expected to reach this point early next month.

**Big Timber Deal.**

The most important real estate transfer recorded during the past week was the purchase of over 2000 acres of timber land on the Deschutes, south of Bend, by the Deschutes Lumber Co. The consideration was \$36,420, or approximately \$17.50 an acre. Albert N. Johnson was the former holder of most of the timber lands in the tract.
