

SHOOTING SCRAPE AT MADRAS

Both Participants Badly
Wounded.

ONE EXPECTED TO DIE

Deputy Sheriff Bruce Balfour
and Attorney Bernier
Now at Madras.

A. J. Weston and Bogue Harper, both former members of the Madras police force, met in Culp's pool hall yesterday in Madras and engaged in a pistol duel. Weston has two ugly wounds and Harper two. Harper is thought to be fatally injured.

Weston is a man who has been on police duty in several cities and has had much experience in that kind of work. He is over six feet in height and weighs over 200 pounds. He was on the Madras police force for some time, but for some reason resigned the place and two months ago applied for the position of nightwatch for Prineville.

Following Weston's resignation from the Madras force, Bogue Harper was put on duty. There has been bad blood between the men for some time and Harper is said to have made statements that he would throw Weston "in the cooler," but never made an attempt to do so.

Harper gave up his position on the force the first of the year to Marshal-elect Loveland.

According to the facts as they have been received by Sheriff Balfour, Weston was in Culp's pool hall at noon Wednesday and Harper came into the place and at once commenced to shoot at Weston. The air was full of fire and smoke for a few seconds and as soon as it cleared away both men were found to be bleeding from

wounds. Harper was shot in the neck. Weston had ugly wounds in the hand and in the thigh. Both men had shot twice, using pistols and each bullet had taken effect.

Sheriff Balfour was notified of the affair by Mayor Turner of Madras, and Deputy Sheriff Bruce Balfour and Attorney G. L. Bernier left for Madras at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. It is thought that Weston will recover unless some complications arise from the thigh wound, but the latest reports received today say that Harper is in a grave condition.

The New Council.

The new council met Tuesday night. Present—Mayor Edwards, Councilmen Rosenberg, Yancey, Ward, Noble and Winnek.

Licenses were granted to five saloons at the regular Tuesday night meeting of the council, namely, Walter Snodderly, Chas. A. King, Frank E. Brosius, Smith & Allingham and Wiley & Quackenbush.

No applications were rejected and the license committee reported that all applicants had complied with the provisions of the ordinance with one exception, and that one had promised to make the changes in the interior of the building to comply with the ordinance.

The bridge on Second street was ordered covered.

Engineer Brewster reported that the sidewalk on each side was in the street. He will make a report at a special meeting of the council Monday night covering the estimates for the cost of grading Third street.

A. W. Yancey was appointed nightwatch and the application of a Mr. Segal for a license to operate a wholesale liquor house in Prineville was referred to the license committee.

An ordinance was ordered drawn to cover the licensing of soft drink places and billiards and pool halls. This will be presented at an early meeting.

Local Campaign

Expenses.

All candidates for county offices have filed their bills of campaign expenses with County Clerk Brown. There were six justices elected in the county, none of which expended funds to secure their election.

Of the county offices the greatest amount of money was expended by candidates for the sheriff's office, a total of \$414.05, being the amounts turned in to the clerk.

Sheriff Balfour expended the largest amount, according to the statements rendered. His expense for the primary election was \$101.50, while \$67.75 was expended in the general election. The largest items in the bill are traveling expenses and the second largest printing. John Edwards spent \$80.50 and A. J. Coulter, \$62.40.

Commissioner Bayley spent \$1 to insure his re-election, and Warren Brown spent \$21 in the primary election. Surveyor Rice expended \$12 in both campaigns and his opponent, George S. Young, spent \$33.85 in the primary election.
