COUNTY FAIR HOLDS MEETING

New Officers Elected Yesterday.

ASSOCIATION CLEAR OF DEBT

No More Spring Races Will Be Allowed on the Grounds.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the First Central Oregon Agricultural Association met Monday at 2 o'clock at the Commercial Club rooms in this city and elected a board of directors for the coming year; and took preliminary steps for the fair which will be held in October, 1911.

Wm. Boegli, G. W. Russel and J. Oliver Powell were chosen as directors, and with the two remaining members of the board which will be appointed by the governor within a few days, will constitute the board of control for 1911.

Three hundred and fifteen shares of stock were represented at Monday's meeting out of 540 that have been issued. There were no conflicting interests at the meeting. The board chosen is the strongest possible combination of men that could be selected to insure a successful fair.

At a meeting of the new board held just after the election, it was unanimously decided that there should be no spring racing on the association grounds, as such meetings only weaken the fall fair and the practicability of a good Fourth of July celebration.

The financial report shows the association to be out of debt, and with some funds on hand. This is the first time the association has been in so good a condition financially.

The ground of the association, which consists of 80 acres of very rich bottom land, most of which is set to alfalfa, has been leased by the association for some years. It was returned to the management at this meeting. While many

parties are anxious to rent or lease the land from the fair management, it is probable that the land will be cared for by men hired by the day, as much more can be made from the ground in this way.

As soon as the remaining members of the board have been appointed by the governor, which will be within thirty days, a meeting of the complete board will be held, and a president and secretary will be selected to carry on the work for the coming year.

Never were the prospects so bright for a prosperous year and a successful fair.
