Redfield of the objections raised by the district attorney.

In the matter of the petition of Guy E. Debon et al for county road, the papers having been heretofore submitted to the district attorney and upon his approval thereof it is therefore ordered that the board of road viewers meet at beginning of said road on the day of 1911, view, review and survey said road and report their findings thereon at the next meeting of this court.

Regarding the Glenn H. Loucks petition for county road, it appearing from the opinion of the district attorney that the affidavit of posting is defective, it is therefore ordered that the matter be continued until the next meeting of this court and that the clerk notify W. Glenn Loucks of the objections raised by the district attorney.

J. J. Coen et al petition for county road, continued for want of affidavit of posting.

G. W. Wells et al petition for county road, continued for want of affidavit of posting.

H. P. Wilson et al petition for county road, continued for affidavit showing that notices were posted in public places as requested by the district attorney.

W. M. Ogg et al petition for county road; continued until next meeting of this court because of failure to show that notices were posted in public places, and for failure to give date of posting. All in the opinion of the district attorney.

James T. Robinson et al petition for a county road, continued until the next meeting of this court for failure to file bond or affidavit of posting notices as required by law.

And now is presented to the court the resignation of G. M. Slocum as justice of the peace for Redmond precinct which is hereby accepted, and upon the recommendation of several citizens of Redmond, it is ordered that J. C. Williams be and is hereby appointed justice of the peace of Redmond precinct until the next general election.

Upon written request of District Attorney Wilson, the matter of a logging franchise on the Deschutes river is continued until the May term of this court.

The Claude C. Dunham et al petition for county road, it is ordered that the county clerk forward all papers to District Attorney Wilson for his opinion thereon, with the request that the same be returned to this court prior to March 20, to which time this matter is continued.

Road supervisors' appointments. Pursuant to continuation heretofore entered herein John Montgomery is hereby appointed road supervisor for Montgomery precinct No. 4, and H. A. Brown is hereby appointed road supervisor for Haystack precinct No. 6, J. L. Windom having failed to qualify; and M. J. Lemons is hereby appointed road supervisor for Hardin precinct No. 19, Joseph Street, who was heretofore appointed having failed to qualify. S. Nae is hereby appointed road supervisor for Kutcher precinct, the former appointee having failed to qualify. Clerk to notify appointees.

The W. G. Fordham et al petition for county road is continued for informality and failure to file bond.

Regarding the petition to vacate certain streets and alleys in Opal City the following order was made: Whereas, the Opal City Land Company and the Oregon Trunk Railway have filed, in the above entitled court, their petition praying for the vacation of certain streets in the townsite of Opal City, in Crook county, Oregon; and

Whereas, said petitioners have caused to be posted in three conspicuous places within the townsite of Opal City a copy of the notice stating that a petition for the vacation of the said streets has been filed and will come up for hearing in this court on Wednesday, March 1st, 1911, as more particularly appears from the affidavit of Harold E. Beard, which has been duly filed in this court; and

Whereas, the said petitioners have prepared and filed in this court the hard paper map and linen tracing showing the streets to be vacated, in accordance with the laws of Oregon; and

Whereas, it appears from the said amended petition that the petitioner, Oregon Trunk Railway, is the owner of a strip of land three hundred feet wide across that part of said townsite in which the streets hereinafter mentioned are located; and

Whereas, the Opal City Land Company is the owner in fee simple of all the land abutting on the streets and alleys hereinafter named; and

Whereas, the petitioners, Opal City Land Company and Trunk Railway, are the only persons who will be affected by the vacation of said streets and alleys; and

Whereas, it appears to the court that it will be to the best interests of the petitioner and the public to have the streets hereinafter described vacated, and

Whereas, the county surveyor and the county assessor have approved said plat and tracing thereof as being in compliance with the code and the court being fully advised in the premises. It is therefore ordered and adjudged that the following streets and alleys in the town of Opal City, in Crook county, Oregon, to wit:

All of Cameo avenue excepting where the same crosses Third street. All of Topas avenue excepting where the same crosses Third street. Pearl avenue from the west line of First street to the west line of Third street.

Garnet street from the west line of First street to the west line of Second street. All the alleys in blocks 43, 52, 53, 56, 57, 60, 61, 62, 63, 64, and 65; be and are hereby vacated.

And it is further ordered that the hard paper map and tracing thereof filed by the petitioner, showing said streets herein vacated be and are hereby approved.

Now is presented the court the report of the county clerk showing payment on bounty of four hundred forty-eight scalps, one hundred seventy-eight bobcat front feet and six cougar front feet, amounting in all to eight hundred sixty-six dollars and fifty cents. Said scalps and front feet were then reduced to ashes in accordance with the code.

Upon the application of Frank T. Redmond et ux, owners in fee of the land platted under the name of "Redmond Acres," and it satisfactorily appearing to the court that said plat and tracing thereof, together with the dedication of the streets and roads as shown thereon to the public forever have been filed with the county clerk, that the same have been duly approved by the county surveyor and the county assessor, and it further appearing that all the requirements of the law have been complied with, said plat and tracing thereof is hereby approved and ordered spread of record.

Upon Constance Reid, owner in fee of the land platted under the name of "Imperial," and it satisfactorily appearing to the court that said plat and tracing thereof, together with the dedication of the streets and roads as shown thereon to the public forever have been filed with the county clerk, that the same have been duly approved by the county surveyor and the county assessor, and it further appearing that all the requirements of the law have been complied with; said plat and tracing thereof is hereby approved by the court and ordered spread of record.

And now is presented to this court the application of George A. Stevens to have liquor license heretofore issued to Stevens & Deadman transferred to George A. Stevens; also a new bond executed by the said George A. Stevens with W. N. Cobb and E. H. Powell, as sureties, in the penal sum of \$1000 it is ordered that bond be approved and said license transferred.

Now on this day is presented to the court the petition of George P. Elliott et al for a county road, and upon due consideration it is ordered that the county clerk forward all relative to said road to Fred W. Wilson, district attorney, for his opinion as to their validity.

Now on this day is presented to the court the petition of T. W. Taylor et al for a county road and upon due consideration it is ordered that the county clerk forward all papers relative to said road to F. W. Wilson, district attorney, for his opinion as to their validity.

Upon application of Guy E. Debon et ux, owners of the lands platted under the name of "Debon-Slocum acreage" and it satisfactorily appearing to the court that said plat and tracing thereof, together with the dedication of the roads as shown thereon to the public forever, have been filed with the clerk of this county, that the same have been duly approved by the county surveyor and the county assessor, and it further appearing that all the requirements of the law have been complied with, said plat and tracing thereof are hereby approved by the court and ordered spread of record.

After a careful examination of said new Prineville-Redmond road, the following contract of completion is hereby entered into.

This agreement made and entered into this 2nd day of March, 1911, by and between D. D. France of Powell Buttes, Oregon, and the county court of Crook county, Oregon, Witnesseth.

That the said France for and in consideration of the sum of \$325, hereby agrees to complete the so-called Prineville-Redmond county road as follows:

To harrow said road; to remove all loose or float rock therefrom; to blast or otherwise remove such boulders or solid rock therein as may seriously interfere with travel thereon; To fill in at the foot of all steep grades or projecting firm rocks upon said road as already laid out and to cover all parts of said road as run across such rocky lands to a depth of at least ten inches with good earth; to grade across all low places or swales where waste water has run to a maximum height of one foot; to construct a sixteen foot bridge not to exceed eight feet in width at the lowest part of a certain grade to be made across what is locally known as Sage Flat; and also a similar bridge not to exceed ten feet in width on the north and south road where there is at the present time a deep ravine or gully; To remove all high centers from said road and leave the same in a suitable condition for one and two horse vehicles including also automobiles; It is hereby further understood and agreed by all parties hereto that said work is to be done under the general supervision of Commissioner R. H. Bayley; that said road shall be at least sixteen feet wide from ditch to ditch with at least a

six-inch crown; provided, that except where the said France makes a grade as hereinbefore provided; that the ditch and width heretofore constructed shall be and remain the same; It is further ordered that work shall commence upon said road at the Prineville end and as soon as frost and weather conditions permit, and that work be diligently prosecuted until the completion of this contract; It is further agreed that the said France is to build the said bridges at his own expense, subject to the supervision of the said Bayley, and that the county is to furnish France with the necessary lumber delivered wherever needed; and that in case any corrugated culverts are needed the said France, upon the direction of the said Bayley, hereby agrees to install the same; It being understood that the material therefor is now at the warehouse of W. F. King in Prineville, Oregon, and is to be hauled and placed in position by the said France; it is further agreed that upon the completion, to the satisfaction of said Bayley, of the first ten miles of said road, the said France is to receive a payment of \$150.

Whereas Crook county has secured from J. F. Taylor 135 pieces of timber 18 feet long, 7 inches in diameter, and 20 pieces of timber 14 feet long and 5 inches in diameter the same amounting in board measure to 4270 feet, it is therefore ordered that the county clerk draw a warrant on the road fund for the sum of \$10.67, the same being at the rate of \$2.50 per thousand.

Whereas Crook county has secured from E. T. Bateson 128 pieces of timber 18 feet long, 7 inches in diameter, and 9 pieces of timber, 30 feet long, 8 inches in diameter, the same amounting in board measure to 4425 feet, it is therefore ordered that the county clerk draw a warrant on the road fund for the sum of \$11.06, the same being at the rate of \$2.50 per thousand.

Whereas Crook county has secured from N. F. McCain 50 pieces of timber 14 feet long, 5 inches in diameter, the same amounting 550 feet in board measure, it is therefore ordered that the county clerk draw a warrant on the road fund for the sum of \$1.37, the same being at the rate of \$2.50 per thousand.

Whereas Crook county has secured from W. H. Loftin 46 pieces of timber, 18 feet long, 7 inches in diameter, 28 pieces of timber 14 feet long, 5 inches in diameter, and 29 pieces of timber, 20 feet long, and 7 inches in diameter, and 8 pieces of timber 30 feet long and 8 inches in diameter, the same amounting in board measure to 3150 feet, it is therefore ordered that the county clerk draw a warrant on the road fund for the sum of \$7.91, the same being at the rate of \$2.50 per thousand.

Whereas Crook county has secured from Cort Allen 60 pieces of timber 15 feet long, 7 inches in diameter, 5 pieces of timber 14 feet long, 16 inches in diameter, 5 pieces of timber 14 feet long, and 17 inches in diameter, and five pieces of timber 14 feet long, 18 inches in diameter, the same amounting in board measure to 4330 feet, it is therefore ordered that the county clerk draw a warrant on the road fund for the sum of \$10.82, the same being at the rate of \$2.50 per thousand.

Now on this day is presented to the court the official bond of Warren Brown, county clerk, and it appearing to said court that the said Warren Brown was duly elected county clerk on the 5th day of November, 1910, and said bond being a good and sufficient bond with W. C. Congleton and M. R. Elliott as sureties the same was accepted and approved.

Popularity of the Centrifugal Pump. The centrifugal pump is constantly conquering new domains. For example, it has begun to replace the reciprocating feed pump in large central power stations. It is especially suited to this service by its self adjusted regulation and its ability to work for a certain time against the closed discharge pipe. It may be left quite to itself with a changing volume of feed water delivery. Only in the boiler plants of electric power stations, where electric current may be obtained at low rates, will this type of pump be economical. As it is especially adapted to the delivery of small quantities of water against a high pressure, it is often speeded to the highest point, even up to 3,000 revolutions a minute. Especially on shipboard it has lately been adopted to an ever increasing extent because of its small weight and space requirements.—Engineering Magazine.

Alcohol in Solid Form. The invention of a way to reduce alcohol to a solid form is attributed to the president of a wood alcohol company at Wheeling, W. Va. He has discovered how to make wood alcohol from sawdust and then makes the alcohol into half inch square chunks that cut as if they were made of cheese. A match touched to one of the little cubes of alcohol brings forth a fine bright flame, and there is not the slightest trace of smoke. Neither is there the slightest smell. By utilizing waste sawdust he claims to produce alcohol so cheap that it can underbid gasoline, which will make it available for automobiles and for all purposes for which denatured alcohol is recommended.

Protection From Lightning. In the course of a lecture before the members of the Engineering Society of Birmingham, England, Sir Oliver Lodge made the statement that it was by no means true that a building was protected from lightning when it was provided with a conductor reaching to the tallest part of the structure. In fact, he said that immunity from the flash was assured only when the building was completely covered in a metal cage. He said the problem was to dissipate the great energy of the flash, but it was not wise to dispose of it too quickly. As far as known at present, a thin iron wire offers the best protection, but it is not foolproof.

The Way to Float. This is the advice of an old swimmer to the one who cannot swim: "Any human being who will have the presence of mind to clasp the hands behind his back and turn the face toward the zenith may float at ease and in perfect safety in tolerably still water. When you first find yourself in deep water you have only to consider yourself an empty pitcher. Let your mouth and nose and not the top of your heavy head be the highest part of you and you are safe. But thrust up one of your long hands and down you go, turning up the handle tips over the pitcher." There are reasons and logic in this.

Give the Cow a Chance. Before disposing of the presumably poor cow it is well to know that your feeding and care are not at fault. It is our judgment that cows in general are not as poor as our feeding methods. In other words, many good cows do not have a chance to show themselves.
