### School Grounds Too Small

Larger school grounds is a pertinent question for the people of Prineville to consider before the new building is started this spring. All are agreed that the present site is entirely too small for the six upper grades and when you add the little people of the first and second grades that are now provided for down town, it can readily be seen that there would be no room for play grounds.

In the Prineville school district there are 274 children enrolled. This number will double in a year or two. There is no question about that. What are you going to do with them? Build more schools? Yes, but build in a location that will admit of indefinite expansion. Two blocks away from the present site is five acres donated to the city for park purposes. This tract would make an ideal site for a public school building. If an exchange could be effected whereby the present school site could be traded for the park grounds and a park made out of the school site it would be of unestimable value to the public schools. Give our boys and girls plenty of room for outdoor exercise. Think it over before the new building is started.
