Recently Henry E. Dean, commissioner of parks and public property in Kansus City, Kan., sent letters to business and professional men in the Armourdale district asking them to appear at Shawnee park prepared to spend the day in the work of cleaning the district of weeds and trash. That the school children also might be interested they were asked to clean the yards and alleys.

They began to gather as early as 700 o'clock in the morning-lawyers, merchants, doctors, preachers, real es tate men-armed with shovels, hoes and an abundance of enthusiasm. An

The party was divided into three one to work on Osage ave nue, unother on Kansas avenue and a third on cross streets. Wagous, fur nished by the city and by business firms, were on hand to follow the workers and collect the results of their

Up one side of the street and down the other they worked, cleaning the street and parkings of weeds and papers and pilling them for the wagons to collect and carr away. And school boys who had not been detained at home to clean the yards followed the shovel and hoe brigade with brooms. New Italian Process Eliminates the

empoyature F The precedure described sounds so elaborate that one can scarcely beursores. First a simple solution of 100 parts of water, 25 parts of com-mon salt and 4 parts acetic acid is prepared. Then when the beast is killed the veins are drained of blood, and the solution is injected into the

system in its stead. The original experiments were made at Turin, and the animals experimented upon were hung up in an even temperature of 61 degrees F. and allowed to remain there for two mouths and a half. Then the creatures were skinned, cut up and prepared for the scientific revel. Who the devotees were that indulged in the repast is not generaily known as yet, but all tests showed that the flesh was tender, exceedingly palatable and in every respect as good as fresh meat, if not superior. It is declared that there need be no time limit to the preservative powers of this exceedingly cheap and simple solution.-Chicago Tribune,

How to Cut a Left Hand Thread With a Right Hand Tap.

The illustration herewith shows how a left hand thread can be cut with a right hand tan. Two holes are drilled
