It Is Worth Money to You

Mail via Madras Next Monday.

Mail service to Central and Interior Oregon will be established over the Oregon Trunk Railway April 10.

A contract was entered into last week between the Government officials and the traffic department of the railway, which will continue in effect for a year. All the mail for stations on the line of the Oregon Trunk will be carried, as will that for Prineville, Bend, Redmond and other points in the interior of the state that now are served out of Shaniko. Mail matter will be delivered in Madras and other towns on the railroad at least 24 hours earlier than at present, and in some places the time made by the stage will be cut down nearly 48 hours.

Application for this service was made to the postoffice department as soon as the Oregon Trunk started operating over the new road, but the request had to be handled through the usual channel of officials between Portland and Washington, with the result that inauguration of quick delivery was delayed more than a month.

The express companies started sending their consignments over the new road on the second day after it was opened for traffic.—Oregonian.

St. Paul Capitalist Here.

Mr. and Mrs. A. A. White of St. Paul, Minn., are in Prineville this week looking after their interests here. Mr. White bought the Poin-dexter Hotel property last fall and is here for the purpose of fixing it up and putting it in first-class shape. Mr. White has extensive

interests in Mexico and went south for the purpose of inspecting them. When he got to El Paso, Texas, he changed his mind. Not that he was afraid, but railroad travel was so uncertain he decided to call off the trip for the present. He was among the sightseers that crossed the Rio Grande from Texas to witness the "ruckson" in Mexico. The town he visited was captured by the insurgents and was in danger of momentary attack by the federals. He didn't stay long. Mrs. White, however, didn't get cold feet and wanted to see what it was all about.

City Council.

The city council met in regular session Tuesday evening. Present—Mayor Edwards, Councilmen Noble, Yancey, Ward and Winck, Recorder Brees, and Officers Weston and Yancey. The minutes of an adjourned meeting and the last regular meeting were read and, after a few corrections, approved. T. H. Lafollette, on behalf of the school directors, came before the council to see what could be done in the matter of exchanging the school site for the park ground. He was informed that every member was in favor of it and it was now up to the directors to place it before the people.

Councilman Ward was instructed to look into the matter of surveying a 100-foot channel for the Ochooc within the corporate limits of the city. He assisted Surveyor Rice a few years ago in this work but beyond making a preliminary survey nothing else was done. The council intends to take up the matter and see if piling or other means cannot be used to confine the stream to its banks in high water. Property owners along the stream have long been anxious to see something done and will lend the council every aid to prevent the useless waste and damage by high water.

Chief of Police Weston reported seven arrests for March and the collection of \$76 dog tax. Officer Yancey reported three arrests for March. Recorder Brees reported 10 arrests

with fines totaling \$68, \$42.50 was received for licenses. Total amount received by him during March was \$119.50.

The quarterly report of City Treasurer Smith showed a balance on hand of \$4783.40.

The following bills were ordered paid: R. L. Brewster, city engr., \$60.00; C. S. Edwards, cash paid John Adams for work, 2.75; P. L. & W. Co., 30.00; W. F. King Co., 30.50; R. W. Brees, recorder's fees, 19.25; Mrs. Maling, hall rent, 25.00; A. J. Weston, March salary, 100.00; A. W. Yancey, March salary, 100.00; L. Kamstra, 1.50; Lippman & Co., lumber, 13.00; B. E. Kinder, hauling, 5.50; Ed Harbin, 35.00; Earl McLaughlin, 2.50; T. E. J. Duffy, 7.50; Journal, 38.00; Winck Co., 31.70.

Officer Weston was instructed by the mayor to have the Main street cisterns repaired. Some of them were not in good condition. An ordinance was passed placing the city treasurer on a salary basis. His compensation is placed at \$25 per month. Council adjourned to meet the first of the week.

Annex Meeting.

At the regular monthly meeting yesterday of the Ladies' Annex the following officers were elected: President, Mrs. Doonar; vice-president, Mrs. Edwards; secretary, Mrs. Adams; treasurer, Miss Baldwin. The treasurer reported over \$200 on hand.

The following committee was appointed to purchase furniture for the ladies' room which has recently been fixed up by the Commercial Club: Mrs. Stewart, Mrs. Belknap, Mrs. Amanda Elkins. This large room, together with the additional space added to the library, will give the ladies plenty of room in which to fix up comfortable and attractive quarters. A new book-case was ordered for the library.
