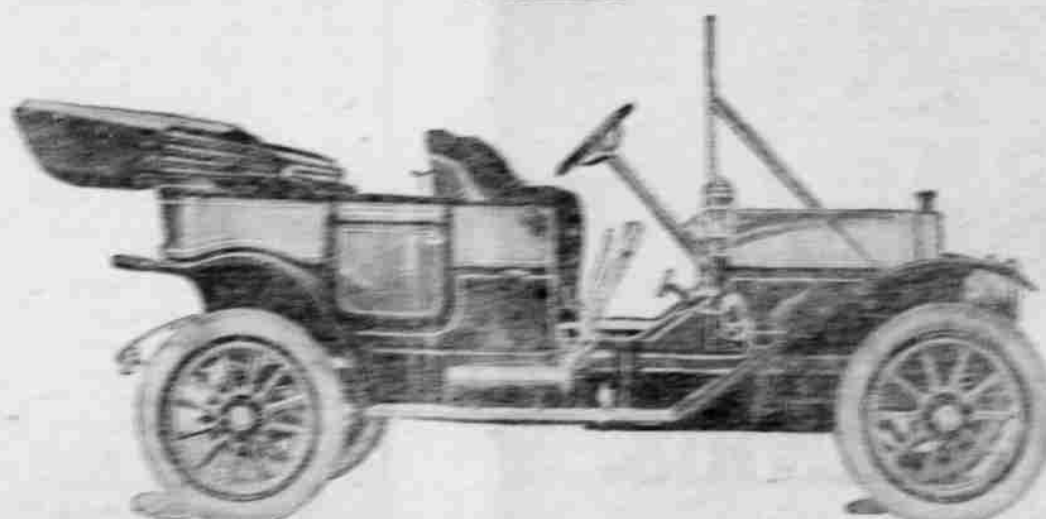

May Build This Way.

A dispatch from Madras to the Oregonian says that with the approach of the steel gangs on the Harriman or Deschutes, railroad leaving nearer, local interest is beginning to center on the construction of the big steel viaduct across Willow Creek canyon, just west of town, where that line crosses the Oregon Trunk at a height of over 200 feet.

Although a large amount of material and equipment has been assembled there and work is in progress on the concrete foundations for the supporting towers, much difficulty is experienced as to whether the bridge will ever be completed. The main reason for this is the fact that the Harriman line is seriously considering changing its route at a point a few miles north of Madras and crossing the canyon along the east edge of the mountain above it. It is possible following Willow Creek, and thence over the Powell Butte ridge.

It is said that the canyon is being re-forested by the timber plantations, so it would be a serious question whether all the way north from this place, as well as south, that line gradually all the timber of the Powell Butte Center and give the upper land to all the height and passenger service is well known to the country.

The saving in the building of the great bridge would be the loss of considerable revenue on the new route, which only runs a few miles north of the two roads on the mountain to the point

on the north line of the National road. While the change of line would throw the Deschutes system into the Powell River valley, there is said to be an outlet north of Prineville by way of Henry Canyon, which would again swing the line on to the plateau east of Bend, only a few miles from its present course southward toward Klamath county.
