

DISTEMPER IN HORSES.

Great Care Should Be Taken With Lining Young Animals.

Distemper, or strangles, is a disease principally affecting young horses. It is due to a germ belonging to the streptococci group. The disease is accompanied by high fever, catarrhal inflammation of the mucous membranes of the nasal passages and as a result of this condition a discharge from the nose, according to a Colorado bulletin. There is a swelling of the lymph glands under the jaw, which later results in abscess formation.

A horse with distemper can communicate it to a healthy one. The germs

are found in the discharge from the nostrils and the pus from the abscess which forms under the jaw and later breaks.

The majority of cases of distemper occur before the age of fifteen years. The constitutional disturbances caused by the shedding of the teeth and cutting same, as well as impure air in poorly ventilated stables, overworked and poorly fed animals are factors that weaken the resistance and make infection possible to produce the disease.

The disease is more common in the spring and fall of the year, particularly the former, on account of the chill received at these seasons of the year.

The disease can also be transmitted from dam to offspring through the milk. The animal usually develops the disease in from three days to three weeks after being exposed to the contagion.

Animals affected with distemper should not be sold. Young animals should not be brought in contact with those affected nor watered out of the same bucket nor come in contact with any other property until it has been thoroughly disinfected. An animal should not be castrated while suffering with strangles.

MAKING COTTAGE CHEESE.

Authority's Suggestion For Getting Good Result From Buttermilk.

In view of the recent discussion of methods of obtaining the curd from buttermilk, many readers may be interested in a method successfully employed by the writer in making cottage cheese from buttermilk. This method, which is the embodiment of simplicity itself, is as follows:

Add at the rate of one pound of skim milk to about six pounds of buttermilk. Thoroughly mix and heat to 104 to 110 degrees F., when the curd will almost instantly separate. By this method it is just as easy to make cheese from buttermilk as from skim milk. There is no reason why a single pound of buttermilk should be wasted. If it cannot be fed, drunk or sold as cheese, it should be turned into dried casein, the same as is done with a great deal of skim milk.

Feeding Young Pigs.

Bran, milk and pasture are some of the bulky feeds well adapted to the real young pig. They help to distend the digestive system, which enables the pig to better advantage than the pig raised on concentrates.

DAIRY NOTES

To Get Better Milk Prices.

If it were not so hard for some milkmen to steer clear of the water pal honest dairymen might expect better prices for milk.

Dehorned Cow Easy to Handle.

Dairymen generally like cows without horns. They are much easier to handle, there is less risk of their being injured, and they take up less room.

Regularity in Milking.

Milk quietly, quickly, cleanly and thoroughly. Cows do not like unnecessary noise or delay. Commence milking at exactly the same hour every morning and evening and milk the cows in the same order.

Muslin Covered Windows.

Cows should not stand facing a window unless the window be covered with muslin. By the way, the muslin window in the cow stable is better by far than glass. It gives a subdued light and furnishes ideal ventilation.

Cleanliness in Dairying.

Although the factor of keeping clean both milk and cream may not appeal to some farmers as much as it should, there is one phase of the subject that may. That phase is cleanliness as a guard against the dissemination of disease by milk and cream.

Worth of Dual Purpose Cow.

The dual purpose cow will produce only about a dollar's worth of milk for a dollar's worth of food. The successful dairymen must have the cow that is especially built for the production of milk, the cows that will produce \$2 worth of milk for \$1 worth of feed.
