road is completed. All the grading is done.

Colonists from Eastern points who remained in Central Oregon seem to be well satisfied and are joining with the old residents in enthusiastic expressions over the future of the country. Many settlers are breaking raw ground and will cultivate it this year. Thousands of additional acres will be put to seed this Spring and the output of crops will be greatly increased.

Well Will Provide Water

Grain and livestock seem to be the principal industries. Fruit-raising is not likely to be taken up to any great extent for a few years.

Absence of water, from which the country always has suffered, soon will be overcome. Wells driven to depths of less than 450 feet have encountered flows of cool, fresh pure water, that spouts freely through the artesian wells. In many places pumps have been put in and water is hoisted to the surface at a little cost. This supply is used mostly for domestic purposes. It has not been tried for irrigation because of the cost of obtaining it in sufficient quantities. Although the low fares have been withdrawn by the railroads, colonists continue to come into the newly opened country.

Several large irrigation projects will be opened within a few months and those already in operation will be improved.—Oregonian.
