GOOD POINTS OF THE DUROC-JERSEY HOG

There are three great breeds of hogs, and in the order of their numbers they are Poland-Chinas, Duroc-Jerseys and Berkshires. The Duroc-Jersey hog is rapidly becoming more popular, and deservedly so, writes an Ohio swine grower in Rural New Yorker. They have all the good points of the Poland-Chinas, but the sows have larger litters of pigs and the ability to save them, while the fat hogs when ready for market outweigh Poland-China hogs of the same age and finish. The picture shown here-with is of a pure bred Duroc-Jersey sow in fair condition. The Duroc-Jersey and the Poland-China breeds originated in Ohio and constitute the corn belt type of hog. Long grown by breeders who selected for neatness of frame, a result favored by a ration, principally corn, which consisted largely of fat and carbohydrates and low in content of protein and calcium salts, hogs of these two breeds are chunky, early maturing and producers of the best lard in the world. Hogs of these breeds are fine of bone and fatten easily at early ages, making pos-

able the large run of 175 and 200 pound hogs that were so much in demand during the present year.

Though of the fine boned, meat built, chunky type of hog, the Duroc-Jersey is not so extreme as the Poland-China, being somewhat larger and possessing more scale. Its color is a rich red or mahogany and is very pleasing. The faults of the breed are a tendency toward too large litters of undersized pigs, faulty backs and a tendency to sandy colors. The writer does not have much faith in the oft repeated statement that sows of chunky conformation are less prolific and poorer mothers than sows of leaner type, for it would seem that it is a question of being too fat. Instead of a question of conformation, it is one of getting too much fattening food and not enough nitrogen and calcium phosphate and other needed calcium salts in the rations.

Corn the Best Silage.

Silage has been produced in this country for a comparatively short time, but its place is firmly established as an adjunct to the dairy. It provides a cheap, succulent food of uniform quality and is easily handled and fed. There has been a great deal of experimental work with silage, several crops having been used, such as clover, alfalfa, soy beans, sorghum and corn. Crops that may be easily preserved, such as hay and clover, are better cured, all things considered, than silage. Corn is easily the first as a plant for the silo. Large quantities may be grown on a small area of land, and it makes a silage possessing a delightful aroma.

Look After Weak Cattle.

All cows that are weak, extremely thin and coughing must be removed from the herd. Milk from unhealthy cows is not safe to use, and only cows in good health can make profitable use of the food given them. The herd should be inspected at regular intervals by a competent veterinarian.—Illinois Experiment Station.

Bran For Dairy Cattle.

Wheat bran is an excellent feed for dairy cows. Mixed with cottonseed meal it is a splendid concentrate. Balance the ration with good hay.

City Council Adjourned Meeting

An adjourned meeting of the city council was held Tuesday evening. Present—Mayor Edwards, Councilmen Rosenberg, Winnek, Ward and Noble. Recorder Breese and Officer Weston.

Officers for the election May 29 were appointed as follows: Judges—John Henderson, D. P. Adamson and Geo. Whittis. Clerks—A. R. Bowman, Addie Foster and Claude E. Smith.

Two ordinances were passed to final reading and approved. One ordinance makes it a misdemeanor to leave a driving animal unhitched on any public highway in the city of Prineville, or any person allowing any driving animal to stand without food or water on the public highways of the city for more than six hours, or any person that leaves any driving animal on the public highways of this city after twelve o'clock midnight, will be subject to fine or imprisonment or both.

The other ordinance makes stringent penalties for serving drinks to minors or allowing them to loiter around saloons, and also places the ban on habitual drunkards.

Warning to Saloon Men.

An ordinance passed by the council of the city of Prineville makes severe penalties for serving drinks to minors and habitual drunkards. They must not be allowed to loiter on the premises. The penalty for selling liquors to minors is a fine of from \$5 to \$100, or by imprisonment from two days to thirty, or by both fine and imprisonment.

In the case of habitual drunkards the fine is from \$50 to \$100, and in default of payment of such fine shall be imprisoned in city jail one day for each \$2 of such fine and costs, not to exceed 30 days.

Crook County High Complimented

Returning from a trip through Central Oregon, Superintendent Alderman reports an activity in school affairs there which is surprising to him. He declares that the school facilities are keeping pace with the active development of that section and reports an exceptional increase in school attendance.

At Prineville, where the Crook County High School is located, the attendance has gone up 50 per cent in the last year.

"This is an exceptionally fine high school," stated Superintendent Alderman. "The old courthouse has been removed so as to adjoin the handsome school building and is being used as a portion of the school. A teachers' training department, a class in agriculture, a commercial course are a few of the departments in high school work which are proving to be practical.

"The students in Central Oregon, I find, are willing to undertake anything and are live and enterprising. They are decidedly loyal to their institutions and are aiding materially in developing them, as well as their section of the state.

"I was at Prineville, Redmond, Madras and Laidlaw and find that the work of the schools is remarkable.

"Redmond has three times as many pupils as last year and it is necessary for the town to hold school in halls above stores, so rapid has been the increase. The Oregon Trunk has proved to be a godsend to the schools as well as to the country."

Railroad Officials Visit Prineville

Lewis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern Railway; Carl R. Gray, president of the North Bank road and the Hill lines in Oregon; George B. Harris, chairman of the board of directors of the Burlington system; James Patterson, a prominent wholesaler of St. Paul and a stockholder in the Great Northern, came in Tuesday evening with W. P. Davidson, president of the Oregon & Western Colonization Co.

These gentlemen held informal talks with our business men and expressed pleasure at the evidences of growth and prosperity. Pointing to the foundation of the new Crook County Bank building, Mr. Hill remarked that it looked good to him. He referred to the street grading and other improvements going on as being right in line with up-to-date towns. "No, I am sorry I have no railroad news for you," he said. "This visit is for the purpose of familiarizing Mr. Gray with the territory tributary to our lines. He can act more intelligently with questions that come up for his decision."

Of course it was not expected that Mr. Hill would talk railroad, but the fact was significant that Mr. Davidson had charge of the party and was going over the lands owned by his company.

The party left Wednesday morning for Burns. Mr. Stinson, the local agent for the colonization company, accompanied them. He and Mr. Davidson are expected back tomorrow. The railroad officials will return by way of Bend and meet their private car which was left at Opal City.
