He raises spinach, cabbage, asparagus, radishes, lettuce, peas, beets, onions, etc., and finds a ready market with good prices for all he can produce. Some years the season is backward, like the present, but before the summer is over you will forget all about it. If it turns off warm now Mr. Radloff will raise good crops of all kinds. He does not irrigate, but uses hot beds. From four acres of potatoes alone last year he made \$400. Mr. Radloff would not state how much he made a year from his garden, but said he was well satisfied. He claims his dry land potatoes cannot be beaten anywhere. Mr. Radloff owns two ranches and is comfortably well off in this world's goods.

Warning to Saloon Men.

An ordinance passed by the council of the city of Prineville makes severe penalties for serving drinks to minors and habitual drunkards. They must not be allowed to loiter on the premises. The penalty for selling liquors to minors is a fine of from \$5 to \$100, or by imprisonment from two days to thirty, or by both fine and imprisonment. In the case of habitual drunkards the fine is from \$50 to \$100, and in default of payment of such fine shall go for \$500 if taken at once. Address P. O.
