Warning to Saloon Men.
An ordinance passed by the council of the city of Prineville makes severe penalties for serving drinks to minors and habitual drunkards. They must not be allowed to loiter on the premises. The penalty for selling liquors to minors is a fine of from \$5 to \$100, or by imprisonment from two days to thirty, or by both fine and imprisonment.
In the case of habitual drunkards the fine is from \$50 to \$100, and in default of payment of such fine shall be imprisoned in city jail one day for each \$2 of such fine and costs, not to exceed 90 days.
