

MANY AMERICANS TO BE AT CORONATION

Predictions Are That 100,000 Will Be Present and Will Spend \$25,000,000.

London.—Whatever anxiety existed in London a month ago regarding the probable size of the contingent from the United States during the coronation season is giving way to a comfortable belief that that country will be represented quite as liberally as originally predicted. Americans are already taking London by storm.

The latest estimate says it is likely that "as many as 50,000 Americans habitually passing half the year in Europe will be here during coronation week, and quite as many more will have crossed the Atlantic for the express purpose." This may prove an ultra-optimistic prediction.

According to the same authority the outlay in London of the average American will be "at least 50 pounds sterling." This prophecy is well within the mark.

Referring to the arrival of John Hays Hammond and the sailing of the Delaware, which will be the biggest battleship at the naval review, a London paragrapher remarked that, judging from the description of the battleship and from the history of Mr. Hammond in South Africa, Washington is "bent on complimenting us by sending a couple of first class fighting machines."

Thresher Sales Increase.

Walla Walla, Wn.—Three hundred and thirty threshing outfits will be supplied by Walla Walla manufacturers to the harvest fields of the Northwest this year. Indications everywhere point to big crops, and while there are practically as many machines in the field this year as there were last, 350 more will be sent out from Walla Walla.

DEMOCRATS OPPOSE WILSON

Ingratitude Is Charged and Secret Plans Made to Check Boom.

Trenton, N. J.—The regular Democrat's organization of New Jersey is plotting secretly to check the Presidential boom of Dr. Woodrow Wilson, Governor of the state. Dr. Wilson has antagonized the old leaders—particularly James Smith, Jr., of Newark—and they will accuse him, among other things, of base ingratitude to the forces that elected him.

The movement is being conducted quietly. The anti-Wilson forces have been laboring to take from Dr. Wilson the prestige that the indorsement of his own state would give him in the National Convention, at the same time that Dr. Wilson has been making his tour through the West and South to let the people "size him up." It is clear that Dr. Wilson will have the fight of his life right here at home.

Railroad Men Form Organization.

Salt Lake.—Delegates representing the different crafts employed by the Harriman Railroad system completed the organization of a system federation here adopting a constitution and by-laws and electing officers. The federation will deal with the companies through an advisory board of 36 members, each representing one of the crafts of each line in the system.

Judge Overrules Eight-Hour Law.

Riverside, Cal.—That provision of the eight-hour law for women applying to hotels was held to be unconstitutional in a decision handed down by Superior Judge Denmore of this county.
