BRIEF NEWS OF THE WEEK

The celebration of the Fourth of July this year was the "safest and sanest" the country ever witnessed. Stronger and heavier than its rival, the Harvard rowing crew easily won the annual race from the Yale men by 19 lengths.

A strawberry shortcake measuring 21 feet by 21 feet—441 square feet—was served to the inmates of the state hospital at Massillon, Ohio.

Asiatic cholera has appeared at Auburn, N. Y. Tomaso Birardi, an Italian immigrant who arrived there three weeks ago, died there in a lodging house from the dread disease.

A fast mail and passenger train on the Philadelphia & Erie Railroad was held up five miles from Erie, Pa., by 12 masked men. The mail and express cars were rifled and three of the crew were wounded.

That 15,000 women and girls will be thrown out of employment in New York and a \$10,000,000 industry destroyed by the Shea bill for the protection of birds which has gone into effect, is the declaration made by business men.

One of the greatest religious meetings held in the United States this year gathered Tuesday morning in Portland, when the national convention of the Disciples of Christ, better known as the Christian Church, opened; 6000 delegates were in attendance.

The large gatherings of the week included the biennial convention of the International Christian Endeavor Union in Atlantic City, the annual assembly of the Jewish Chautauqua Society of America at Milwaukee, and the annual convention of the National Education Association in San Francisco.

NEWS OF NOTED PERSONS

Hoke Smith has been inaugurated governor of Georgia for the second time.

Franklin K. Lane, interstate commerce commissioner, will visit the north Pacific Coast some time this month.

Curle Guild, the new American ambassador to Russia, with Mrs. Guild,

sailed for Liverpool, en route to St. Petersburg.

In the Kentucky Democratic state primary Congressman Ollie James received the nomination for United States senator.

Eugene F. Ware, U. S. Pension Commissioner under President Roosevelt, died unexpectedly from heart disease at Casada, a summer resort a few miles west of Colorado Springs, Colo.

It is reported that Mrs. Theodore P. Shonts, wife of the president of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company of New York, and a recognized society leader in America, has caused papers to be served on her husband in a suit for separation.

With an exhibition of speed, daring and cleverness never before witnessed on an aviation field, Charles Terres Weymann, an American youth, retained for the United States the Coupe Internationale d'Aviation, the greatest prize in the aviation world, in an aviation contest in England.

In sustaining the demurrer of S. Foster Kelly, a wealthy Seattle banker, recently prominent in the matrimonial troubles of Albert J. Henry and Iva May Henry, his divorced wife, to a suit for \$100,000 damages for seduction, Judge Sturtevant, of San Francisco, practically threw the suit out of court, declaring the statute of limitations for the offense—one year—favored Kelly.

The Desert Land Board

Members of the Desert Land Board and State Land Board left the night of July 4 for a two-week's inspection trip of the irrigation projects in Southern and Central Oregon.

The party included Governor West, State Treasurer Kay, Attorney-General Crawford and State Engineer John H. Lewis. James R. Linn, a member of the State Parole Board, probably will accompany the party. It is probably Secretary Olcott will be unable to attend because so far there has been no appointment of a chief clerk and he is conducting the affairs of the office alone.

The first stop will be at Klamath Falls, from which place they will go by automobile to Lakeview, where the Governor and members of the State Land Board will take up questions in connection with the Warner Valley Stock Company case. From there the entire party will go into Warner Valley, 20 miles west of Lakeview, to examine a Carey Act project of 130,000 acres, which has been more or less actively under way for some time. Returning to Lakeview the party will go north to Paisley, where considerable difficulty has been encountered in securing the reclamation of a 12,000-acre project under the Carey Act.

From there they will go to LaPine at the head of the Deschutes River to examine progress on a 31,000-acre project of the Deschutes Land Company, where the party expects to find steam shovels at work and general activity apparent.

From this point they will go to Bend and over the work of the Central Oregon Development Company, which has taken over the old Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company. The Desert Land Board has just approved the sale of 63 tracts of land in that section, aggregating 3465 acres, the liens on which amount to \$88,182. It is probably the party will return directly to Salem from Bend, coming over the new railroad. Later in the year the boards will probably cover all of the projects in Eastern Oregon.

NEW STORES PREVENTED

Cleveland Druggist Gets Tobacco Case Decision Brought to Bear.

Cleveland, O.—By appealing to the Department of Justice, Clifton M. Rawlins, druggist, has succeeded in having the recent decision of the U. S. Supreme Court in the tobacco case brought to bear on the United Cigar Stores Company, and the opening of two new stores by that concern here is abandoned. This is said to be the first time the decision has been put into effect.

Mr. Rawlins pointed out to Attorney General Wickersham that the decision stated that the American Tobacco Company, or its subsidiaries, were not to enlarge their business.
