Trustee to Settle Kinney's Affairs.
Marshfield.—The affairs of Major L. D. Kinney and his two hot-air railroads, the Belt Line railway and the Coos Bay Rapid Transit Company, which were formerly in the bankruptcy courts, are in the hands of W. J. Rust, of this city, who will for two years act as trustee. This will make possible the sale of the property so that a clear deed can be given and the expenses and judgments will be paid off by the trustee from the money received from sales.

Full Payment of Depositors Made.
Portland.—With the distribution of \$120,000, ordered by the federal court, R. S. Howard, Jr., receiver of the Title Guarantee & Trust Company, will complete the payment of all depositors' claims against the suspended institution. The aggregate of these claims on the failure of the bank in 1907 was \$2,000,000. The disbursement of the \$120,000 ordered will complete the payment of all depositors, including 4 per cent interest.

COUNTIES SEEK PUBLICITY

Wallowa and Union May Unite in Campaign to Secure Settlers.
Wallowa.—Workers from all the towns of Wallowa county will meet here July 12 to formulate plans for county publicity and to consider the proposal of Union county commercial clubs to join them in a two-county league. This action is the result of the visit of seven Union county business men to Wallowa and other Wallowa county towns. It is proposed to issue a booklet descriptive of the two counties.

There is more unused land in Wallowa and Union counties capable of producing record-breaking crops than in any other two counties in Oregon. Business men are awakening to the necessity of having this land producing, and efforts will be made to let people in over-crowded centers of population know of the opportunities that await them in this favored section.

Picnic Drives Away "Rollers."
Sheridan.—Following a picnic given by the Christian Church of this place, in the city park, the band of Holy Rollers that has been assembled at that place for the last three weeks has left the city. Teachers of the "faith" declare that with the intrusion of a band of picnickers that their sanctuary was desecrated with the spirit of the evil one and that they could no longer teach the "word" when the divine atmosphere has been so disturbed.

Own Net Traps Fisherman.
Astoria.—August Williams, a boat puller employed by John W. Holmstrom, fishing for the Union Fishermen's Co-Operative Packing Company, was drowned when the boat capsized near the end of the jetty at the mouth of the Columbia River. Holmstrom was saved by Captain Wicklund and the Point Adams life saving crew, but Williams became entangled in his net and died like many of the fish he had caught.

"AGGIES" TO REORGANIZE

Alumni Association, Now 1200 Members, to Be Increased.
Corvallis.—The Alumni Association of the Oregon Agricultural College, which has a present membership of nearly 1200, is to be reorganized. The executive committee, of which Edward Aldrich, editor of the Pendleton East Oregonian, is chairman, has prepared a plan for more thorough and effective organization which will be submitted to the members of the association for a mall vote.
There are a dozen or more O. A. C. clubs, local societies, throughout the state, which, under the proposed plan, will become chapters of the state association.

Less "Near Beer" to Be Sold.
Wallowa.—Only one poolroom and near-beer saloon will operate in this city hereafter. Three such places of business have been operated, but a recent ordinance requires them to secure a license, and the city council has decided that one such place of business is all that the community needs.

Sewer System to Be Begun.
Hillsboro.—Work will begin this week on the storm and sanitary sewer systems which include nearly one-half of the city. The work is expected to be completed within 60 days, when the laying of the bitulithic pavement will commence.
