**ALLEN BILL CONSTITUTIONAL**

**Supreme Court Upholds Commission Form of Government.**

Olympia, Wash.—Allen's commission form of government bill passed by the last legislature for municipalities having a population of from 2500 to 10,000 is constitutional.

The Supreme Court so held in a decision handed down in the case of the state ex rel. Gilbert Hunt and others, against Eugene Tausick, Mayor of Walla Walla, and sustains the Walla Walla Superior Court in refusing to quash the proceedings instituted to force him to call a special election for the submission of the question to the voters of Walla Walla.

**McNamara Must Stand Trial.**

Los Angeles—Judge Bordwell handed down a decision holding that his court had jurisdiction and the right to try John J. McNamara on the charge of having murdered 19 persons in the dynamite explosion which wrecked the Times plant October 1, 1910. He overruled the plea of no jurisdiction entered on behalf of the labor leader and sustained the objection of the district attorney.

**NO ADDRESS TO KING**

Lord Mayor Avoids Conflict by Staying at Home.

Dublin—King George received a loyal welcome to Dublin today. The King accompanied by the Queen, the Prince of Wales and the Princess Mary, arrived at Kingstown Harbor on the royal yacht Victoria and Albert.

The Lord Mayor of Dublin, whose threat that he would present an address to His Majesty, despite the contrary decision of the corporation, it was feared would lead to trouble, remained at home.

The Nationalists adopted a passively friendly attitude. They did not participate in the official reception, but did not interfere with it. They decorated their premises, always, however, with the Irish flag. If more than one flag was shown, the second was the American emblem, so there was a liberal display of the Stars and Stripes. In the general decoration there was a discreet intermingling of orange and green.

**Alaska Frontiersmen Die.**

Seattle.—Two of the most spectacular figures in western borderland history crossed the great divide at Kattalla when Mike Duval, "the father of Kattalla," who at one time was one of the most highly valued members of General Nelson A. Miles' scouting forces, was drowned, and "French Pete" Emalfard, a pioneer of Alaska since five years after Seward's purchase, and discoverer of the famous Treadwell mines, died from heart trouble.

**NEWS PARAGRAPHS FROM OTHER CITIES IN OREGON**

A postoffice has been established at Rowens, Wasco county, with Frank W. Bourhill as postmaster. W. J. Wilson, an Oregon City liveryman, was appointed coroner of Clackamas county to succeed Dr. Thomas J. Fox, resigned.

Superintendent Alderman says 490 Oregon teachers are in attendance at the National Educational Association now meeting in San Francisco.

Decision has been reached by the State Board of Agriculture to place hard-surface pavement at the state fair grounds from the depot to the main entrance.

Four clubs, including all the most important towns in the valley, are organizing a baseball league in the Rogue River Valley and will play a late season this year.

Receipts of the Eugene postoffice for the fiscal year ending June 30 were \$36,623.52, as compared with \$22,063.05 for the previous year, an increase of 14.3 per cent.

Faculty members are greatly encouraged by the rapid advances made in summer school registration at the University of Oregon, which totals 141 at the end of the second week.

The government will hold a sale of Grande Ronde reservation land at the Siletz agency, August 14, when 2934 acres will be sold to the highest bidder, actual settlers having preference right.

To encourage the development of farming and diversified crops in Oregon, the state conservation commission is preparing to conduct an educational campaign the coming year to teach good farming.

At the special city election held in Hood River to vote on the issuance of \$12,500 worth of bonds with which to purchase the present water system, the bond issue carried by an overwhelming majority.

The offer to the city of Albany of the 44-acre tract of land in Bryant park for city park purposes, was formally withdrawn by the owners. The city council failed to accept the conditions imposed by the donors.

Farmers around Athena are beginning to cut the hay around their grain, thus making ready for the combines to enter the fields. It is freely asserted by the farmers that this is a banner year for wheat.

The list of early closing entries for the big purses at the Oregon State Fair in September were completed by Secretary Frank B. Meredith and shows the best list of early closing entries in the history of the fair.

Immensity of the amount of fees collected in the corporation department of the secretary of state's office is indicated in a statement issued by Secretary Olcott, showing that the fees for 1911-1912 will run over the \$400,000 mark.

The county court of Douglas county has appropriated \$1500 with which to assemble an exhibit for the State Fair and to assist in defraying the expense of agricultural premiums at the annual district fair to be held in Roseburg in September.

Oregon flax will be taken to the linen manufacturers of Ireland, Belgium and other important linen manufacturing countries, to interest them in the industry in Oregon and to further the development of flax-raising and manufacturing in the West.

The work of gathering evidence as far as a criminal charge is concerned against the alleged forgers of the referendum petitions, directed against appropriations of the University of Oregon, has been completed and turned over to the district attorney's office in Multnomah county.

Unless approximately 4000 Oregon automobile owners have their machines registered with the secretary of state during the present month they will be violating the new Oregon motor vehicle law. The law goes into effect August 1, but up to the present time less than 2000 have been registered.

Representative Lafferty has introduced his bill dividing Oregon into judicial districts. The only changes are that the marshal and clerk in the eastern district must severally reside either at Baker or Pendleton, and their deputies must reside at places holding court other than the residences of their chiefs.

Final balancing of the associated student body accounts for the current collegiate year strikingly illustrates the timeliness of the recent adoption of the graduate manager system at the University of Oregon. The books now show a balance of only \$15.82, and several large obligations have been assumed which must be carried over on next year's budget.

To encourage the mining of precious metals in Oregon a law was passed by the Legislature permitting a minimum annual license fee of \$10, provided the companies get their reports in to the secretary of state's office by July 1. Of the 200 or more mining companies in the state about 75 failed to get their reports in by the first of the month and, as a result, will have to pay a fee in proportion to their capital stock.
