Supreme Court Upholds Commission Form of Government.

Olympia, Wash.-Allen's commission form of government bill passed by the last legislature for municipali ties having a population of from 2500 to 10,000 is constitutional.

Gilbert Hunt and others, against Eugene Tausick, Mayor of Walla Walla, and sustains the Walla Walla Superior Court in refusing to quash the proceedings instituted to force him to call a special election for the submission of the question to the voters of Walla Walla.
