TAFT SAYS FUTURE WILL JUSTIFY HIM

Aid of Democrats Acknowledged and Refusal to "Play Politics" Commended.

Beverly, Mass.-In the first state ment made since the passage of the reciprocity bill by the Senate, President Taft at the summer White House freely acknowledged that his long campaign in behalf of that measure would have proved unavailing if the Democrats had not helped him.

"The Democrats did not play politics in the colloquial sense in which those words are used," said the President, "but they followed the dictate of a higher policy."

Those Republicans, he said, who fought for reciprocity, "and some of those votes were necessary to the passage of the bill properly, may onjoy mutual felicitations on a work well done."

In his own judgment, the President said the agreement would mark an epoch in the relations between the United States and Canada, and those who opposed the bill in Congress would find their prophecies disapproved and their fears allayed by its actual operation.
