

COLORADO'S TITLE AS STATE ASSAILED

Federal Attorney Says Constitution Never Was Approved By Congress.

Denver.—That Colorado was never admitted to the Union in the manner provided for by the constitution and is therefore not entitled to the rights, privileges and powers of statehood, is charged by the Department of Justice in a suit filed in the state district court by United States District Attorney Ward. The government's startling allegation is made in a suit between the people of the eastern and western slopes of Colorado, wherein those of the western slope have asked the courts to prevent diversion of water flowing westward from the summit of the Continental divide, by means of tunnels, for irrigation of lands on the eastern slope.

The government, through United States Attorney Ward, has intervened in the suit, laying claim to extensive rights to power sites along the streams. In outlining the position he will take Mr. Ward advances the contention that the constitution of the Centennial state has never been accepted by the Congress of the United States.

Merger Suit Is Appealed.

Salt Lake City.—Appeal papers have been filed in the United States court in this city by the federal government in the suit against the Union Pacific Railroad Company and others, known as the Harriman merger suit, which was decided last June by the United States circuit court for the eighth district in favor of the railway defendants.

CHINESE REBELS THREATEN

American Warships Hurry to Relief of Missionaries.

Peking.—Admiral Murdock of the American Asiatic fleet, has assumed personal command of the squadron of warships hurrying to the relief of missionaries and other Americans who are fleeing before the wrath of the natives of Szechuan province. Five vessels have been detached from the fleet and ordered to proceed up the Yangtze River and its tributaries.

The government has been unable so far to cope with the situation. The natives of Szechuan province are incensed at the railroad policy of the Chinese government and are threatening to drive out every foreigner. Chentu, the center of the disturbances, is placarded with anti-foreign threats, the people are rising in every section of the city and foreigners are fleeing for their lives.

"Coffin Nails" Burned Up.

Asheville, N. C.—With students, faculty and citizens praying and singing, the last stock of tobacco and cigarettes in Marshall, N. C., was burned on the campus of Marshall College, as the climax of an anti-cigarette crusade.

BEATTIE IS FOUND GUILTY BY JURY

Chesterfield Court House, Va.—Sentenced to die for the murder of his young wife, Henry Clay Beattie sat calmly and indifferently in his cell while his aged father lay at their home in a state of collapse. After sentencing Beattie to death, Judge Watson granted a stay of execution until November 24 to allow the prisoner to file an appeal. No one doubts that the appeal will be denied and that Beattie's liaison with Beulah Binford will lead him to the electric chair.

It took the jury just one hour and four minutes to arrive at a verdict. When, after a 15-minute walk around the courthouse, they retired to their room, all knelt in prayer before taking up consideration of the case.

Public feeling over the crime still runs high in this section and in Richmond, where Beattie lived. The verdict was received with little surprise by the community.

Commission Rule Begins.

Walla Walla.—Monday, Walla Walla joined the ranks of the cities that have adopted the commission government, the new Mayor and two commissioners taking office at noon. The mayor and two commissioners will appoint all officers and will head the three departments of the city, which are public safety, accounting and streets, and public improvements.

Parnell Monument Done.

Dublin.—The elaborate Parnell monument in Dublin, which has been in course of construction for a long time past, at a cost of about \$45,000, is now complete and the unveiling will take place on October 1.

U. S. MUST EXPLOIT COAL

Private Ownership Not to Be Considered by Government.

Seattle, Wash.—"The day for private exploitation and ownership of the vast resources of Alaska are gone—the hands of the clock do not turn backward." That was the keynote of the speech made by W. L. Fisher, secretary of the Interior, just before he left for the East, after nearly four weeks of looking into the coal land problem in the North.

"Private ownership of the coal lands is out of the question. Whether the coal lands be leased by the government or whether the government work the coal lands under direct federal management, is the only question to be determined."

Will Start Trip on Birthday.

Washington.—Friday, on his 54th birthday anniversary, President Taft will start from Beverly on the most important trip that he has planned since he has been in the White House. The trip will take him through nearly the whole of the Southwest and West, as far as the Pacific Coast. His first stopping place will be Syracuse, N. Y., where he will attend the opening of the New York state fair.

OFFICIALS CHARGED WITH BRIBE-TAKING

Gary, Ind.—Charged with accepting a bribe of \$5000 in connection with the granting of a heating franchise, Thomas E. Knotts, mayor of Gary, a spectacular figure in a district of fast and furious politics, was arrested, with five of his councilmen, and C. A. Williston, city engineer.

The arrest of Gary's municipal officials threw the Steel City into the wildest excitement, and added fuel to the flames of factional strife which characterized Knotts' political career. A dictograph arrangement in the mayor's office and in a room at the Gary Hotel is said to have recorded conversations with all the men involved, as they figured in arranging the passage of the franchise.

Mayor Knotts' regime has been a stormy one and the city administration has been one constant turmoil. Mayor Knotts, with Chief of Police Martin, was indicted last December with seven other city officials on a charge of conspiracy to murder Thomas Grant, sheriff of Lake County, in the county election in November.

Nine Killed in Mexican Riot.

Mexico City.—Nine persons were killed and more than twice that number injured when Reylistas and Maderistas clashed in Tuxtla-Chico, a village in the State of Chiapas, near the southern boundary of Mexico, according to reports received at the President's office.
