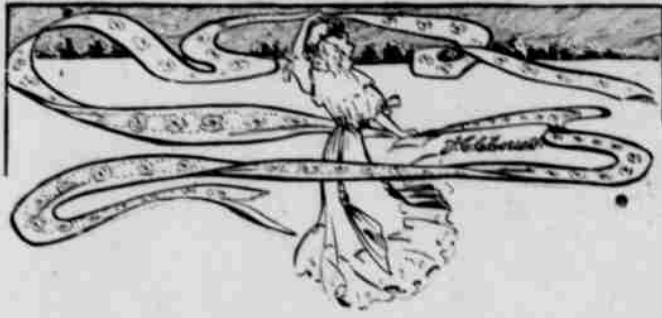

### Railroad Celebration

#### At Redmond.

Committees from the Redmond Commercial Club are making plans for Railroad Celebration day, to be held there soon to commemorate the advent of the Oregon Trunk Railway in that city. The date has not been definitely set. President Gray, of the Oregon Trunk, has notified the president of the club that it may be possible to run a special there for October 2, but as the Central Oregon Development League meets at Burns on that date and the railroad officials of the road want to attend that event, it was deemed advisable to fix another date for the celebration at Redmond. President Gray has now wired that it may be possible to get special trains there about September 25, or perhaps sooner, and the club has taken the matter up with General Passenger Agent Conan. If possible the celebration is to be held the latter part of this month. Quite a delegation of members of the Portland Commercial Club has promised to attend the celebration there, and the railroad officials of the Oregon Trunk and Deschutes roads have signified their intention of being there to help along with the ceremonies. Governor West and other state officials will also be there. The programme of the day will consist of baseball games, with good sized purses; Wild West bronco-busting, band concerts, speaking by prominent men, and a big banquet. Preparations have already been made to take care of the big crowd that will come from all parts of Central Oregon, as well as from Portland and the Willamette Valley.

### Southern Pacific

#### File Answer.

The long expected answer of the Southern Pacific railroad company to the suit filed by the government for the recovery of 2,273,000 acres of land held by the company as state grant lands was filed at Salem on the 6th.

The railroad company in its answer holds that the government has for forty years collected taxes on the unsold portions of the land involved and made no protest against the patenting of the lands in question.

In the government's suit the company was charged with forfeiting all its rights to possession of the land involved when it sold the land off in tracts containing more than 100 acres to more than one individual and at more than \$2.50 an acre, as was specified when the land was given the railroad company.

The value of the land included in this grant and over which the suit is pending, is \$70,000,000.

Suit was brought some time ago by the government on the grounds above to annul the title to the corporations grant lands in this state. After a very hard legal over the company's demurrer Judge Wolverton overruled it, and this answer would appear to mean that the corporation expects to fight the case through to a finish. In fact, one of the greatest arrays of legal talent ever lined up in any case in the history of the country will probably clash when this answer comes up to issue and the final result will be watched for by the general public as it will be one of wide interest, not only in Oregon but all over the United States.

Those who are waiting to take up homesteads on the company's lands, however, would better come to Central Oregon to settle, for there is a strong probability that most of them will die of old age long before the final determination of this celebrated suit. If the company loses in the lower court--and there is every reason to believe it will lose--there is still the circuit court of appeals, and finally the United States supreme court, either of which may reverse the district court.

### LOCAL MENTION

Maine stays dry. The total vote stood: For repeal, 60,216; against repeal, 60,511, leaving a majority of 295 against repeal.

A. A. Camp and Carl Swanson, two of the injured in the Oregon Trunk wreck at Moody, who were to have brought suit at the next term of circuit court for \$5000 damages, have filed a petition with the county clerk that the cases be removed to the U. S. circuit court. After due consideration Judge Bradshaw granted the petitions and the case will be tried at the next setting of the court at Portland.--The Dalles Optimist.

Upon the petition of numerous residents of Lake county, endorsed by Senator Bourne, the secretary of the interior has designated as subject to entry under the enlarged homestead act, lands in Tps. 26 and 27 S. Ranges 15, 16 and 17 E.; and Tp 28 S. R. 16 E., Lake county. These lands are about 12 miles north of Silver Lake. The list of lands designated will be filed in the land office at Lakeview.

A bad cutting scrape occurred Saturday night at Opal City, when Joe Rossi was slashed unmercifully by a companion, Joe Nell, with a sawedoff caseknife. Both are Italians, and both were intoxicated at the time. The quarrel was who should occupy a certain bunk in the bunk house, and Rossi, being the larger man, slapped his companion, who after repeated attacks drew his knife and cut Rossi so badly that the Opal City surgeons were doubtful as to his recovery. Rossi was taken to a hospital at Portland, and yesterday word came that it was thought he would live. Nell was arrested Sunday, admitted the act, and is now in the county jail.
