OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Eggs Taken to Hatchery. Astoria-Deputy Fish Warden Rathbun arrived here Wednesday with the first consignment of Chinook salmon eggs for the new hatchery on the Klatskanie River. Sufficient troughs have now been installed to handle about 3,000,000 eggs and another consignment will be brought down in a few days. Mr. Rathbun left for Ketchikan, Alaska, to secure several milfion sockeye eggs, which will be procured from the government hatchery at that place. Some of these will probably be brought to the Klatskanie River plar".

Water issue to Be Voted.

Klamath Falls.-One of the most Important irrigation propositions undertaken under the new Oregon law concerning such enterprises will be voted on November 21 by residents of Yonna, Langell and Lost River

It is proposed to issue bonds to cover the cost of establishing the irrigation supply, and owners of 20,000 acres, which it is hoped to benefit, are expected to vote favorably. It is to be known as the Horsefly Irrigation district.

WAGON LOADS RESTRICTED

Polk County Court makes Law to Keep Highways In Good Shape.

Sheridan.-The ranchers of Polk County have adopted a novel way whereby they mean to save the roads. The farmers advocated restricting loads being drawn over the best roads, which exceed a certain weight, and the county court was appealed to for assistance in the matter. As a result the Polk County court has just placed legal restrictions on the size of loads that may be carried over certain prescribed thoroughfares. Hereafter it will be unlawful in Polk County to haul over prohibitive roads, loads in excess of 3500 pounds on wagons with tires less than four inches wide, or 4500 pounds on vehicles with tires between four and six inches wide, the weight of the wagon being considered as a part of the load,

Decision Is Important.

Eugene.-The state supreme court handed down a decision in the case of the citizens of Cottage Grove vs. Lane County, in which it holds that the county court is not compelled to levy a tax, the proceeds of which shall be used exclusively for roads, onehalf the amount to be distributed among the different road districts of the county, and that the county may pay for highway improvements out of the general fund.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

An agitation has been started to have the Klamath Indian reservation opened.

"The land of contentment" is what President Taft dubbed Oregon on his recent visit.

The annual Oregon State Baptist convention is being held in McMinnville this week beginning Tuesday, October 17.

Taxable property in Multnomah County not including public service utilities has an assessed valuation of \$294,894,445, according to the assessment for 1911.

The latest report of the enrollment of Portland public schools shows 25,-772 pupils to be in attendance. This is a gain of 2233 over the enrollment at this time last year.

By an order from the county court all road work in Multnomah County has been discontinued except the completion of a few unfinished pieces of new road and necessary repairs.

In Oregon, according to Charles G. Yale, of the United States Geological Survey, the total value of the mine production of gold, silver and copper in 1910 was \$700,676, against \$827, 901 in 1909.

That thousands of dollars are annually withheld by county clerks, notaries and justices of the peace throughout the state that rightfully belong to the game protection fund, is the statement made by State Game Warden Finley.

All attempts to capture the murderer of Mrs. Eliza Griffith, who was murdered at her home four miles south of Philomath on the night of June 1 and whose body was found in a small creek near by on the following day, have been given up.

Census Director Durand Issued the first official statement from the census bureau relative to the statistics on irrigation in Oregon. It shows that the total number of farms irrigated 1909 was 6669, against 4636 in 1899, an increase of 2033, or 43.9 per cent. Within the same period the number of farms in the state had increased 27 per cent, indicating that irrigation is increasing more rapidly than dry farming in the state.

The Secretary of the Interior has issued an order that 32,900 acres of unappropriated public lands, excluded from the Deschutes national forest by proclamation July 1, will become sub ject to settlement under the home stead laws and to selection by the state under certain conditions on and after January 1, 1912, at the land office in The Dalles. The lands are located in Crook County, near Prineville, and are surveyed.

FLAG OF REPUBLIC RAISED IN CHINA

Revolutionists Are Now in Control of Four of Richest Provinces.

Peking.-The Manchu dynasty after more than 300 years of misrule, appears to be tottering to its fall. Four of the richest provinces of the empire are in the hands of the rebels, three corps of the imperial army have deserted and the flames of revolt have spread to the gates of the capital, which may be in the hands of the reb

The revolution has been hanging over China for months, and the rising in the provinces of Szechuen was only a small part.

The revolutionists are well organited and have formally proclaimed the

republic. If plans do not miscarry, the noted exiled revolutionist, Dr. Sun Yat Sen, leader of the anti-Manchu party, is to be elected president. He was the delegate of the revolutionary party to the United States in 1910, and is believed during that tour to have made arrangements for financing the move-

The great cities are at present in the hands of the rebels. Hankow, Wu Chang and Han Yang, with an estimated population of more than a million and a half, have been captured and are held by a force of 25,000 troops, the majority of whom were trained by American and European officers in the imperial army. Fighting is reported from Nanking, the second city of the empire, and is imminent in the great port of Shanghai.

Peking resembles a smouldering volcano which may explode at any mo-

Violence and bloodshed are in the air and at any moment the dread cry of "down with the white devil" may be heard.

EUROPE IS IN PERIL

Situation in Ottoman Empire Fraught. With Danger for Continent.

Constantinople.-The situation in Turkey is fraught with the greatest peril to the peace of Europe. The opening of Parliament has shown that the Young Turks, the war party, is in complete control. The throne of the suitan is tottering and a general conflagration, which may involve every Old World power, is threatened.
