Alfred began reading a newspaper, which acted as a sort of screen between the two men.

The slayer slipped off his shoes while his brother was interested in the paper, and stole out of the room to where his mother was toiling with her work. Alfred did not hear a sound from the man as he left the couch and did not know William had gone from the room until he heard Mrs. Glisan scream.

He rushed outside and was attacked by his brother, who jerked the knife from the woman's body. The father, Edward T. Glisan, who was in the yard at the time of the murder, hurried to the son's assistance and Wil liam was bound with ropes and held until Deputy Sheriff Burns arrived from Antelope and made Glisan his prisoner.'

Every indication points to an intention to kill his father and brother also. The horrible crime the husband and son were unable to comfort the dying woman, being compelled to subdue the crazy son. Mrs. Glisan died before William was securely
