

HANKOW RECAPTURED BY IMPERIAL TROOPS

Chinese Rebels Receive First Setback and Imperialists' Hopes Revive.

Peking.—The Chinese revolutionists received their first setback in their successful uprising against the Manchu dynasty when the Imperial troops recaptured the city of Hankow after an all-day fight. The casualties of the Imperialists amounted to about 200 while the rebels lost 450. The Imperialists marched into Hankow.

The report of an Imperialist victory in the vicinity of Hankow, received from the minister of war, General Yin Chang, has revived the drooping spirits of the administration. Additional comfort has been found in the conclusion of a loan agreement, which Chinese officials say has just been arranged with a Belgian syndicate, having French and British connections. The loan is for \$18,000,000, the price being 96, with 6 per cent interest. The syndicate receives 4 per cent commission.

Two distinct parties have developed among the Chinese. One embraces the National Assembly, most of the government officials in both provincial and central government and also the conservative business men. This party favors the continuance of the Manchu on the throne, although with a completely constitutional government. The other party, led by Wu Chang and other rebels, aims at the expulsion of the Manchus from Peking.

Pacific Fleet to China.

Los Angeles, Cal.—Their stay in Los Angeles harbor cut to three scant days, the floating fortresses of the Pacific fleet will be rushed from this port to Honolulu or Guam, where Admiral Chaney Thomas will await orders for a dash to Chinese waters to protect American interests or to join the foreign fleets in a movement of intervention.

EXCUSE WAS "SHABBY"

President of W. C. T. U. Attacks Secretary Wilson.

Milwaukee, Wis.—Secretary of Agriculture James C. Wilson came in for a bitter attack by Mrs. Lillian N. M. Stevens of Portland, Maine, president of the national W. C. T. U., at the 28th annual convention of that organization.

Wilson's action in accepting an honorary office of the Brewers' Congress was the point to which the speaker objected, and she denounced his excuse that the farmers were interested in the growing of grain used by the brewers "as shabby, and of no merit or value."

Italians in Peril of Dread Scourge.

London.—As an echo of the battle in which 1000 Italians were killed and wounded and 2000 Turks and Arabs were killed, the Italian forces about Tripoli face a danger greater than bullets. More than 2000 unburied bodies lie in the vicinity of the troop encampments and conditions are ripe for a cholera scourge.

RED HATS FOR AMERICANS

Archbishops Farley, O'Connell and Monsignor Falconio Selected.

Rome.—The Pope will create a large number of cardinals at the consistory to be held November 27. Most Rev. John M. Farley, Archbishop of New York, and Most Rev. William H. O'Connell, Archbishop of Boston, are among those who will receive the red hat. Monsignor Diomedeo Falconio, apostolic delegate at Washington, also will be elevated, according to the announcement.

The selection of the new cardinals is the subject of interesting comment, owing chiefly to the recognition the United States has received. Three red hats have been granted to that country. Monsignor Falconio is an American citizen and with Cardinal Gibbons and Archbishops Farley and O'Connell will bring the number of American prelates up to four.

DARROW LOSES POINT

Bordwell Disallows Challenges Made by Defense of J. B. McNamara.

Los Angeles.—The defense in the McNamara case lost an important point when Judge Bordwell ruled directly against two challenges interposed by them against opinionated venturers. Not only were the challenges disallowed by Judge Bordwell, but he peremptorily refused to permit Darrow to either argue against the ruling or to further question the two men.

As the result of the decision of Judge Bordwell, the defense is considering renewing its motion for a change of judge and when this is refused, as expected, making a motion for a change of venue.

JOSEPH PULITZER IS DEAD

Blind Editor of New York World Suddenly Stricken.

Charleston, S. C.—Joseph Pulitzer, proprietor of the New York World and the St. Louis Post Dispatch, died Sunday aboard his yacht, the Liberty, in Charleston Harbor.

The immediate cause of Mr. Pulitzer's death was heart failure. He had been in ill health for several days, but until a few hours before the end none of those around him suspected the gravity of his condition.

Mrs. Pulitzer arrived from New York and reached the yacht shortly before her husband died. At his bedside when the end came also was his youngest son, Herbert, who has been cruising with his father.

Lumber Mills to Close Thirty Days.

Seattle.—Lumber mills in Oregon and Washington will close for 30 days, commencing December 15, in an effort of the manufacturers to cut down the supply of lumber going into the market, and thereby bring about a rise in prices. This was decided by a resolution adopted by the West Coast Lumber Manufacturers' Association, which met here.

Dam Builders Left Out Bedrock Key.

Olean, N. Y.—Alexander McKim of New York, who was sent to Austin, Pa., to report on the cause of the breaking of the dam, has reported that the "bedrock key," specified in the plans, was not installed when the dam was built. "It was an appalling mistake," reads the report.

AUTHOR'S VENTURE IN MINES PROBED

New York.—Turning from the writing of real literature, as he has done on occasions, to the writing of mining prospectuses for companies to which he lent the weight of a great family name, Julian Hawthorne is being investigated, together with his associates, by the Federal authorities. Millions of shares of stock in "Hawthorne" enterprises are said to have been sold to school teachers, clerks, widows and other persons of moderate or even small means throughout the New England States, where there is great power in the name Hawthorne.

The United States officers for some reason are pushing the case with more than usual vigor. Involved with Hawthorne in the inquiry are Jas. B. Hanna, nephew of Mark Hanna; Dr. William J. Morton, son of the discoverer of ether, and Josiah Quincy, ex-mayor of Boston.
