## **Events Occurring Throughout** the State During the Past Week.

Government Gets Fish Food.

Astoria.—The Union Fishermen's Co-operative Packing Company is preparing fish food for the fisheries department, and is packing it in 10pound cans. About 10,000 pounds of this food, consisting principally of tured salmon heads, has been put up, and the greater portion of it will be used at the Klaskanine River plant.

Medford District Fire Losses Light. Medford.—The annual report to the National Forest service for the year 1911, just transmitted by the Medford Forest Bureau, established a low record for forest fires during the season as far as losses are concerned. The data show there were 68 fires, 46 in the reserve and 22 on private land threatening the property within the government boundaries.

Eugene.-The third annual Lane County apple show has opened with exhibits much larger than at both of the previous sessions put together. Not only is the amount of fruit exhibited much greater, but it is drawn from a much wider territory, practically all sections of the county being presented:

## TO COLONIZE LAND GRANT

Deal Under Way for Big Land Tract in Eastern Oregon,

Ontario.-A deal is now pending of gigantic importance to Eastern Oregon whereby a company of Ontario capitalists will purchase 200,000 acres of land from the Oregon & Western Colonization Company.

The land is located along and included in the old Willamette Valley and Cascade Mountain wagon road grant, which was purchased by Minnesota capitalists a little over a year ago, and includes every odd section of a strip of land two miles wide and about 140 miles in length extending west from Ontario to Burns.

Colonel E. R. Place, of Caldwell, Idaho, and H. W. Dorman, of Ontario, and others have taken an option on the 200,000 acres and have gone to Minnenpolis, where they expect to close the deal for its purchase. Their purpose in acquiring it is colonization.
