City Council Met Tuesday Evening

The council met in regular session Tuesday evening. Mayor Edwards in the chair. Councilmen Shipp, Yancey, Noble and Ward were present.

The minutes of the last regular and special meetings were read and approved.

Mr. Delore presented a petition for a sidewalk on the north side. As it lacked a majority of signatures of the property owners affected, the council returned it to the circulator.

The matter of collecting the water rent was taken up and the attention of the marshal was directed to same. He was also instructed to collect for lumber sold by the city.

The council thought a \$5 license for pool and billiard tables was too cheap so an ordinance will be drawn up to increase the amount.

Wade Huston, acting city marshal reported 9 arrests. Recorder Breece reported 16 arrests for October. The fines and license collected during the month totaled \$192. Report approved and ordered filed.

The city marshal was instructed to collect the money due for grading East F Street.
