New Stallion Law.

Attention of the owners of stallions and jacks is called to the new stallion law which went into effect on May 20, 1911.

A number of horsemen have not complied with the provisions of the law. It is necessary that all stallions and jacks used for public service must be licensed by the State Stallion Registration Board at Corvallis, and that they must be inspected by an official inspector appointed by this Board. Attention is also called to the fact that, according to this law, stallions which were in the state at the time when the law went into effect and licensed during the first season will be li-

censed even though unsound, although such unsoundness, if present, will be stated in the license. All horses, however, which are not used for public service unless they pass the proper veterinary inspection. It is very important, therefore, that horsemen who are delinquent in this matter get in their applications at once. Stallion owners who have already received license for their horses will confer a favor upon their neighbors by calling their attention to this fact.

Horsemen are also urgently requested not to purchase stallions or jacks until after they have been inspected by one of our state inspectors and have received their state license, for otherwise it may prove that such stallions or jacks may prove unsound and hence not eligible to be used for breeding purposes in this state, or it may be found that their pedigrees are bogus and that they will have to be licensed as Grades or Mongrels instead of Pure Breeds as represented.

Concerning Sumner's Tragic Death

EDITOR JOURNAL—I wish to correct the article that was printed in regard to my brother Thomas' tragic death. The exact truth will never be known.

On October 22 Thomas Sumner, who had spent the night at the ranch of Ed Jones, remarked that it was his birthday and he was going to kill something. A few years before he found droppings of a quartz ledge but could not locate the place and this was the object more than hunting game, that took him to the top of Little Grizzly.

The man that found my brother was a perfect stranger to me. I do not even know his name. I was not with my brother and had not seen him for several days.

This man that found my brother was out hunting and had a companion. They separated and were to meet near the foot of Little Grizzly. When this man that found my brother heard the report of the gun he thought it was his partner. His dogs ran up to the place and acted so queerly that he investigated finding the body. He did not know who it was.

I was at my uncle Fred Stewart's place when the news came in over the telephone. This man, known to me only as Curly, did his duty and I owe him my lasting gratitude.

The position of my brother's body when found indicated that he had set the gun down and leaned it against a limb and had seated himself on the ground and leaned against the trunk. The gun must have slipped and some way discharged. The ball penetrated his head nearly tearing the top off. He was lying in a natural position. The gun was several feet away. There are some features that I cannot explain. The position of the gun and the way the ball penetrated the limb, but I am confident he died by the accidental discharge of his gun. GUY SUMNER.

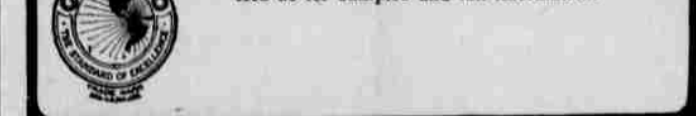
