

TRIAL OF CHICAGO PACKERS HAS BEGUN

Ten Face Prosecution in Federal Court With Jail Sentences Possible.

Chicago.—After more than nine years' investigation by the government, the first criminal prosecution of individual meat packers under the Sherman anti-trust act has begun here before Judge Carpenter, in the United States District Court.

Ten Chicago packers were placed on trial charged with monopolizing and restraining interstate trade in fresh meats. The penalty which may be inflicted if they be found guilty is a fine of \$500 or a sentence of one year in the county jail, or both.

Widow Applies for Cut in Allowance.

San Francisco.—For the first time in the history of the San Francisco superior court a widow applied for a reduction instead of an increase of her family allowance. Mrs. Anna Meloy Donahoe, widow of the late Michael Donahoe, appeared before Judge Thomas F. Graham and asked that her monthly allowance be reduced from \$3000 to \$2000 saying that the money was more than she could spend.

Road Bond Case Up at Medford.

Medford, Ore.—The second step in the campaign of opposing the \$1,500,000 bond issue for good roads in Jackson County was taken when attorneys for Ed Andrews, the complaining taxpayer, argued against A. E. Reames, the counsel for the county, regarding the legality of the proposed issue.

Holy War is Imminent.

Tripoli.—Reports here from adjacent states say that a jihad, or holy war, is imminent through all North Africa. Advances have reached General Caneva, the Italian commander, that Arab delegations are in Tunis inviting their fellow Mohammedans there to cross the Tripoli frontier and join in a war of extermination.

MUST WAIT SEVEN YEARS

Control of Papers Will Not Yet Pass Into Hands of Pulitzer's Sons.

New York.—Not until Herbert, the 14-year-old son of the late Joseph Pulitzer, becomes 21 years of age and has had some little experience in the publishing business, will the actual control of the Pulitzer newspapers, the New York World and the St. Louis Globe-Dispatch, pass into the hands of the famous editor's sons. Mr. Pulitzer never saw his youngest son, who was born five years after the publisher was stricken blind, but the lad had been the constant companion of his father during his declining years and the terms of Mr. Pulitzer's will indicate that he thought Herbert promised to have great ability.

The terms of the will provide that all the Pulitzer boys come into control of the newspaper properties at the same time. Mr. Pulitzer evidently thought the best way to turn over the guidance to his sons would be when Herbert, the youngest, reached maturity.

Suffragists to Win Working Women.

New York.—Following the victory of the East in the national convention of the woman suffragists, it is announced that a campaign is to be inaugurated here that will have for its chief purpose the spreading of the propaganda of the suffrage among the wage-earning women of this part of the country. The campaign will place emphasis upon the economic phase of the issue.

Garbage Menaces New York Streets.

New York.—New York's streets have become so littered with piles of garbage as the result of the street cleaners' strike that Street Cleaning Commissioner Edwards has begun to use disinfectants.

Election Tie in McKinley's Town.

Canton, O.—The official count complete for mayor shows a tie between Turnbull, Democrat, and Schilling, Socialist. The contest was decided by the toss of a coin and the Democrat won.

RODGERS HAS ACCIDENT

Aviator Falls 125 Feet into Plowed Field, but Escapes Injury.

Los Angeles.—In an attempted flight from Pasadena to Long Beach to end his Atlantic-Pacific journey officially, C. P. Rodgers met with the worst mishap of his career, falling with his machine 125 feet into a plowed field on the Orr ranch, half way between the two cities and within sight of his destination.

Although no bones were broken, Rodgers was badly shaken. His face was scratched and torn, his hands were burned by his motor, and, after recovering consciousness, he complained of a severe pain in his side. His machine was completely wrecked.

Mme. Curie Did Not Elope.

Paris.—Paris, always ready to believe the stories told by scandal's busy tongue, has awakened with a near-sense of shame to the fact that its gossips have been slandering France's chief woman scientist. For it has been established now, even to the satisfaction of those who make scepticism a rule of life, that Mme. Curie, joint discoverer with her late husband of radium, did not elope with Professor Langevin. The rumor of the elopement was published broadcast in Paris.

West May Get Cardinal.

Rome.—The appointment of a fourth American cardinal, who shall represent the West, is said to be under consideration at the Vatican.

DEATH FOLLOWS IN WAKE OF CYCLONE

Chicago.—The central West was swept by a terrific wind, rain and sleet storm. Reports received tell of death and injury and extensive property loss in Southern Wisconsin, Illinois and Iowa and near the Great Lakes. The storm followed an unusually hot period during which several persons were prostrated.

Southern Wisconsin was the hardest hit. Near Orfordville six deaths are reported to have occurred and at Milton, a few miles away, there was a seventh. The dead in Rock County, Wisconsin, alone will number at least 17.

Woman Leads Wisconsin Teachers.

Milwaukee.—For the first time in many years a woman was elected to head the Wisconsin Teachers' Association. The honor was bestowed upon Mrs. Mary D. Bradford, superintendent of schools of Kenosha.

Brief News of the Week.

Drinking water for the United States army in the future is to be purified by electricity.

The first session of Canada's newly elected twelfth parliament opened Wednesday.

Almost 1,000,000 women will be eligible to vote for president of the United States in the national election next year.

From figures just compiled it appears that the citizens of the United States hold the unique record of licking 30,000,000 postage stamps every day.

The total registration of Los Angeles for the coming city election reached a total of 191,941. Of these 108,736 are men and 82,205 women voters.

The Great Northern Steamship Company's liner Minnesota, which was grounded off Kurushima, near Shikoku, Japan, was floated safely at high tide and proceeded on her way to Seattle.

Between 30,000,000 and 40,000,000 bushels of wheat lie buried and worthless under a foot of frozen snow on the prairies of Western Canada, according to the estimate of local grain men.

Hostility toward Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg and criticism of the crown prince, Frederick William, were features of the debate over the Morocco-Congo affair in the German Reichstag.

The national baseball commission says the players are not entitled to a share of the money obtained from a moving-picture company for the privilege of taking pictures during the world's championship series.

News of Noted Persons.

Andrew Bonar Law has been selected leader of the Unionist party in the British House of Commons, in succession to Arthur J. Balfour, who resigned.

The National Museum has recently received a large and valuable collection of memorials of the late Rear Admiral Winfield Scott Schley of the United States navy.

King George and Queen Mary, escorted by a squadron of battleships, have sailed from England for India, where they will be the chief figures in the coronation Durbar, December 12th.

Andrew Carnegie has announced a gift of \$25,000,000 to the Carnegie Corporation "to promote the advancement and diffusion of knowledge and understanding among the people of the United States."

Champ Clark, Speaker of the National House of Representatives, was endorsed for the Democratic nomination for president by the Democratic convention of the Seventh Kansas Congressional district.

The sudden decision of Pope Plus to hold a consistory this month for the purpose of the creation of 20 cardinals is believed to be explained by the fact that the pope has been warned by his physicians that his end is near.

Henry S. Graves, chief forester of the government, desires to enter into agreements with the western states whereby they may relinquish their scattered school sections in the national forests and take in exchange an equal area of forest reserve lands in compact form.
