## Events of the Year in Review.

### MEXICO AND CHINA UPSET.

Miscellaneous Affairs, Games and Races, and Items of Personal Interest—The Aviation Field—Losses by Accidents and Explosions, Fire and Storms—A Classified Summary.

### POLITICAL AND PERSONAL

**FEBRUARY.**  
1. John Graham Hope Horsley, Lord Deser, married Helen Vivian Gould, daughter of George J. Gould, in New York.

**MARCH.**  
1. Senate vote, 48 to 42, declared William Lorimer of Illinois duly elected.

**APRIL.**  
1. United States supreme court affirmed constitutionality of the corporation tax.

**MAY.**  
1. Cabinet form of government adopted in China, with Prince Cheng, premier.

**JUNE.**  
1. Senate passed resolution for election of senators, 91 to 24.

**JULY.**  
1. Edward, eldest son of King George V., installed as Prince of Wales.

**AUGUST.**  
1. Anglo-American and Franco-American arbitration treaties signed by President Taft.

**SEPTEMBER.**  
1. The Kaiser reviewed 99 German warships at Kiel.

**OCTOBER.**  
1. Monarchist uprising in Portugal.

**NOVEMBER.**  
1. President Taft reviewed in Washington at the close of his western trip.

**DECEMBER.**  
1. First regular session of the 63d congress opened.

**JANUARY.**  
1. C. M. Daniels set new world's swimming record, 1 minute 26 seconds, for 200 meters, in tank at Pittsburgh.

**FEBRUARY.**  
1. Oxford won 6th annual boat race from Cambridge, breaking Oxford-Cambridge regatta records.

**MARCH.**  
1. Louis Blériot at Pablo Beach, Fla., made world auto marks: 40 miles, 21 minutes 23.50 seconds; 200 miles, 2 hours 24 minutes 12 seconds; 20 miles (no previous time for this straightaway recorded), 3 hours 14 minutes 25 seconds.

**APRIL.**  
1. Bob Burman drove autocar 20 miles in 13 minutes 11.52 seconds (51.50 miles an hour), a record at Pablo Beach, Fla.

**MAY.**  
1. H. W. Fitzpatrick, president Southern association of A. A. U., walked 75 yards in 11.45 seconds, a world's record, at New Orleans.

**JUNE.**  
1. American players won second and decisive international polo match at Meadow Brook, N. Y., defeating English team 4 to 3.

**JULY.**  
1. Ad Wolfgang knocked out Owen Moran in San Francisco in 12 rounds.

**AUGUST.**  
1. Ulan trotted a half mile to wagon in 0.2954, at Cleveland, breaking the world's record of 1 minute made by Major Delmar in 1900.

**SEPTEMBER.**  
1. Frank Gotch defeated George Hackenschmidt, in world's championship wrestling bout at Chicago, winning two falls, first in 14 minutes 11.5 seconds and second in 5 minutes 21.4 seconds.

**OCTOBER.**  
1. De Oro won the three-cushion carom championship, beating John Davis, in New York, final score 45 to 14.

**NOVEMBER.**  
1. Princeton won from Harvard at football at Princeton; score 8 to 6.

**DECEMBER.**  
1. Inland national athletic championship tournament for amateurs in New York.

### AVIATION

**JANUARY.**  
1. Meet at San Francisco.

**FEBRUARY.**  
1. Eugene B. Ely, Curtiss aviator, flew from the San Francisco aviation field 12 miles to the deck of the United States cruiser Philadelphia and back to the starting point.

**MARCH.**  
1. Lieut. Bague of France flew over Mediterranean from Avitres, 12 miles from Nice, to island of Gorgona, off Italy, 125 miles, record to date for overseas flight.

**APRIL.**  
1. First aero war message delivered at San Antonio, Tex., by Lieut. Hen. D. Pauline, U. S. A., who flew 52 miles in 48 minutes.

**MAY.**  
1. Louis Breguet carried 11 passengers 2 miles in monoplane in France, breaking record to date.

**JUNE.**  
1. Capt. Princetou, M. Le Martin and M. Lendron, French aviators, killed and 2 injured in Paris to London race.

**JULY.**  
1. Harry N. Atwood reached Washington, having flown from Boston, 458 miles, winning a New York Times trophy and establishing a long distance American record.

**AUGUST.**  
1. Jules Vedrines flew 426 miles, breaking single long distance flight record to date, at Paris.

**SEPTEMBER.**  
1. Alexander Fourny, French aviator, made the record nonstop flight of 447 miles in 11 hours at Paris.

**OCTOBER.**  
1. Cronwell Dixon, American aviator, flew over the Rocky mountains, starting from Helena, Mont., winning a \$10,000 local prize.

**NOVEMBER.**  
1. Lieut. Gavot, Italian military aviator, dropped grenades upon a Turkish camp at Tripoli, first experiment in aerial warfare.

**DECEMBER.**  
1. British Columbia steamer sunk in gale off Vancouver island; 23 lost.

**JANUARY.**  
1. Earthquake in Russian Turkestan wrecked two towns; loss of life estimated at 15,000.

**FEBRUARY.**  
1. State Capitol at Jefferson City, Mo., burned; loss \$1,000,000.

**MARCH.**  
1. Minneapolis, Minn.; loss nearly \$1,000,000 by the burning of the Syndicate block.

**APRIL.**  
1. \$1,000,000 fire in Buffalo.

**MAY.**  
1. \$1,000,000 loss at Portland, Me., by fire in the residential district.

**JUNE.**  
1. \$1,000,000 damage in St. Louis manufacturing center.

**JULY.**  
1. \$1,000,000 loss at Portland, Me., by fire in the residential district.

**AUGUST.**  
1. Loss of \$500,000 by the burning of Chester park, an amusement resort at Cincinnati.

**SEPTEMBER.**  
1. A \$5,000,000 fire in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

**OCTOBER.**  
1. The Eccles building wrecked in Ogden, Utah; loss \$550,000.

**NOVEMBER.**  
1. The Florence Goldfield mining mill destroyed at Goldfield, Nev.; loss \$100,000.

### MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS

**JANUARY.**  
1. The United States supreme court decided the Panama Canal suit against the New York World in favor of the publishers.

**FEBRUARY.**  
1. 15,000 United States soldiers, 15 vessels and 2,000 marines ordered to the Mexican border and gulf coast for mimic warfare.

**MARCH.**  
1. Battleship Texas of Santiago bay fame, sunk by high explosive projectiles in test.

**APRIL.**  
1. United States court of appeals reversed the decision fining the boycotters in the celebrated Danbury hat case.

**MAY.**  
1. Mrs. Julia Murray Barnes, one of the last three surviving daughters of the Revolution, died at Los Angeles, Cal.; aged 98.

**JUNE.**  
1. Mrs. Barney Williams, noted old time actress, widow of the popular comedian, died in New York; aged 82.

**JULY.**  
1. Fete celebrating the naming of America in 1492 held at Saint Die, France.

**AUGUST.**  
1. Bennington, Vt., celebrated its formation as a town 150 years ago.

**SEPTEMBER.**  
1. Van Schalk & Co., noted New York stock brokers, failed, owing \$120,000.

**OCTOBER.**  
1. Tripoli bombarded by Italian warships.

**NOVEMBER.**  
1. President Taft reviewed the great fleet of battleships, cruisers and auxiliary vessels at New York. Over 100 ships were in line.

**DECEMBER.**  
1. James B. and John J. McNamara pleaded guilty to dynamiting in Los Angeles.

**JANUARY.**  
1. The Cincinnati chamber of commerce burned; loss \$1,000,000.

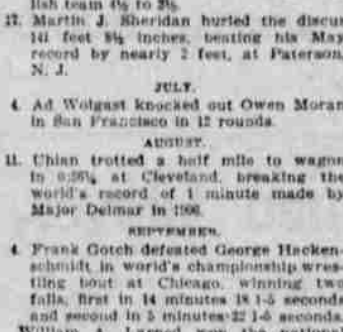
