Attorney W. A. Bell a Candidate

Attorney W. A. Bell of The Dalles publishes his announcement this week as a candidate for the office of district attorney for the Seventh Judicial District, which comprises the counties of Crook, Hood River and Wasco.

Mr. Bell is well qualified for the position. For 16 years he has served as deputy district attorney and thoroughly understands the duties of the office. He moved to The Dalles two years ago but has business here before the circuit court every term, thus keeping him in touch with each section of his district.

Mr. Bell says that if he is nominated and elected that he will give the duties of the office his personal and first consideration to the exclusion of other law business, and will make it an object to visit each county as often as possible, looking after and attending to the office, and assisting the officers in the enforcement of the law, and especially the law to put down vice, immoral acts, and the traffic in white slavery. He further deems the salary of the office sufficient so that whoever is elected should employ his time to the duties of the office instead of making the duties of the office a secondary consideration. Mr. Bell served as judge of Crook county for four years, 1904 to 1908, and by reason of his long residence and acquaintance with the people of this district, and his long experience in the practice of law, he should make an efficient and able district attorney.
