

Bad Fire at Redmond Monday

Redmond suffered a severe loss by fire Monday night. Four business places were destroyed. E. Maher's hardware store, loss \$4000, insurance \$3000; W. H. Hobbs' grocery and bakery, loss \$4000, insurance \$2000; Wright & Delmore's second-hand store and furniture, loss \$300, no insurance; The Redmond Spokesman, loss \$7000, insurance \$3000.

The Spokesman's loss was total, nothing being saved. The paper had installed a linotype only a month ago, and that and other valuable printing machinery were destroyed.

Damage of \$300 to \$500 was done to the Hotel Oregon, adjoining the burned buildings. The Hotel Redmond, across the street, suffered some loss from heat and broken windows.

The cause of the fire was a lamp explosion in Maher's hardware store. The only fire protection was a chemical engine which failed to control the fire at the start.

The Spokesman has already ordered a new printing plant from Portland and San Francisco.

Savings Bank Opened Saturday

The Prineville postal savings bank opened for business last Saturday. Jack Smith was the first depositor.

Accounts may be opened and deposits made by any person of the age of 10 years or more in his or her own name, provided the person is a patron of the office. Only accounts of individuals will be accepted. No charge is made in connection with the opening of an account or withdrawal of money, and strict privacy must be maintained by the postoffice officials regarding accounts.

Deposits are evidenced by postal savings certificates issued in fixed denominations of \$1, \$2, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50 and \$100, each bearing the name of the depositor and other data. No account may be opened for less than \$1, nor will fractions of a dollar be accepted. However, 10 cent postal savings stamps, and a card bearing nine stamps will be accepted as a deposit of \$1. No person is permitted to deposit more than \$100 in any one month or to have a total balance at one time of more than \$500 exclusive of accumulated interest. A depositor may exchange the whole or any part of his deposits in sums of \$20, \$40, \$60, \$80, \$100 or multiples of \$100 up to and including \$500, into registered or coupon bearing bonds of the United States bearing interest at 2 1/2 per cent.

Interest will be allowed on all deposits at the rate of 2 per cent, computed on each savings certificate separately, and payable annually. No interest will be paid on money which remains for a fraction of a year only.

The money deposited with a postal savings bank remains in the town.

The postal savings system was established for the purpose of providing facilities for depositing savings at interest with the security of the United States government for the repayment of principal, with accumulated interest.

Sheep owners are protesting, as they claim they have paid for the destruction of the coyotes and now want the reserve as a range for their flocks and are bitterly opposed to introducing the elk in the forests, but their protest has not met with success.

These have been on exhibition and have attracted considerable attention. Every one of the berries is juicy and ripe.
