

## Buffeted Bovines

### Brought Back

Buffeted about on the billows of attachments and replevin, two valuable Jersey cows, formerly the property of Gunman C. E. Schaffer, have been unable to find a place they could call home since the death of their outlaw master.

Just now the buffeted bovines are in the possession of Ray Nash of Fort Rock, who took charge of them last Saturday on a writ of replevin.

Before the coroner's jury had completed its hearing, Nash obtained possession of the cows on a bill of sale for the animals given by Mrs. R. A. Wilson. Nash, it is said, held two notes for \$15 each against the gunman and it was to satisfy this claim that Mrs. Wilson, Schaffer's companion on the homestead, gave a bill of sale for the Jerseys. Mrs. Wilson alleged that the cows belonged to her.

Schaffer had mortgaged the cows to Eastern Banking Company of Shaniko, for \$275. The bank placed its claim in the hands of Deputy Sheriff D. D. Reeder to collect, who attached the much claimed milkers and brought them to Silver Lake.

Nash followed the stock to this town and, when his talk and other powers of persuasion failed to sway Deputy Reeder and Justice Marvin, he sought the counsel of Attorney T. S. McKinney. Mr. McKinney not only acted as attorney for Nash but became the bondsman of his client in the replevin proceedings.

Attorney Benson, of Bend, counsel for the bank, will be in Silver Lake on March 16 when the bank will make another effort to gain possession of the property for which it holds a mortgage.

It is claimed by the local officials that Nash offered bribes in an effort to obtain possession of the cows without legal procedure.

The above from the Silver Lake Leader in conjunction with the following list of chattel mortgages filed in the County Clerk's office, shows that the late "Gunman" was indeed a clever rogue. There are six unsatisfied chattel mortgages recorded on the county records and all were given from the time of December 30, 1910, to November 14, 1911, or less than one year.

December 30, 1910, he gave his note, in the sum of \$298.65 to the First National Bank of Bend, Oregon, which was secured by personal property. February 15, 1911, his note secured by personal property was given to Mrs. Ben Phillips for \$110. March 3, 1911, one to George F. Beckman for \$150, security horses and wagons. Another note dated May 6, 1911 was given W. H. Million for \$600, secured by horses and wagons. The last to Eastern Oregon Banking Co., for \$275 on cattle.

From the above it would seem that he showed no partiality as he was just as liberal in giving the banking institutions a trial as he was in "cracking" an individual. It is said that his peripatations were easily facilitated by his personality and smoothness of speech.—Lakeview Examiner.

## BRAZILIAN COCOA PALM.

Beautiful and Useful Tree Attains Perfection at Pernambuco.

Pernambuco is situated in the center of the tropical section of Brazil, within which the cocoa palm grows most luxuriantly. The cocoa palm seems to be indigenous to the district which extends from the vicinity of Bahia, on the south, to Parahyba, on the north, but it attains its fully luxuriant and most prolific development in the vicinity of Pernambuco.

The cocoa palm is one of the most beautiful and attractive natural adornments of many of the public parks and private gardens of this city and environs, often attaining a height of from eighty to ninety feet. The trunk is without branches, and the leaves, which cluster in a tuft at the top, are from fifteen to twenty feet in length. At the base of the leaves the nuts hang in clusters, the number varying from three to fifteen, according to the age and condition of the tree.

While this particular palm grows naturally, it thrives a great deal better with care and cultivation, and there are several large plantations near Pernambuco planted within recent years and carefully cultivated which are now returning a fair revenue to the owners. Most of these plantations are located along the coast, but the tree will grow and produce up to an altitude of 2,021 feet.

The nut is first planted in its natural state, with hull and fiber. At the expiration of about twelve months, or when the plant has reached a height of about three feet, it is transplanted and set out in rows about forty feet apart. If cultivated and irrigated the tree will produce at the end of five years; otherwise it will require about ten years to produce. Although the rainfall within this coast region averages about eighty inches per annum, several inches often fall within a very short while, and all falls during the months of the "rainy season," and often when it is of no service to certain vegetation. The summers are hot and dry, and young plants and trees need to be irrigated.

There are two cocoanut markets in Pernambuco—one for the green and the other for the mature or dried nuts. The green nuts, which are picked at about the end of five months and before the real meat of the nut has begun to form inside, are composed entirely of water, for which exclusive purpose they are bought and sold and which forms one of the principal and most popular beverages of that section of Brazil. This water is nonalcoholic and when used is converted into a most savory refrigerant. Its action is diuretic. When the nut is partially mature the inside is sometimes extracted and by the use of sugar and some other ingredients is converted into a popular confection. The meat of the dried or ripe nut is used exclusively for food, being usually seasoned and mixed with different provisions for flavoring purposes.
