Dragon's blood, which is used for oloring varnishes, as a medicine and In photo-engraving processes, is procurable from grocers and druggists in every baraar in India. Both the false and true dragon's blood may be pur

chased in the Bombay market, Sir George Watt says that certain canes and rattans when freshly cut contain a large quantity of a liquid which when evaporated produces a red resin. One of the best known quali-ties of the resin is sometimes called East Indian dragon's blood. This is mostly prepared from the fruits of several species of columns found in the Straits Settlements. The gum exudes naturally from between the senies of the fruit and, being friable, is collected by shaking the fruit into baskets and then sifting the resin from the se, with the proper adaptation to stems and particles of woody fiber. the ages of the pupils in the dif. after which it is melted either by the heat of the sun or boiling water.
