A Very Short Criminal Docket.

LONG LIST OF CIVIL CASES

The Patterson Case Will Be the Principal One for the Grand Jury.

Circuit court opens next Monday. The criminal docket is a short one but the civil calendar is unusually long.

The principal case for the grand jury is that of Ralph W. Patterson of Bend, charged with rape against his 14-year-old stepdaughter. The defendant is in jail under \$5000 bond.

OPEN LETTER TO COUNTY FARMERS

Establish Co-operative Fields.

HELP ALONG THE GOOD WORK

Get in Touch with the Superintendents of the Demonstration Farms.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., April 22, 1912.—Open Letter to the Farmers of Crook County: The two demonstration farms recently located in Crook County are rapidly being put into operation, the seeding being practically completed. A great many varieties of seed of many different crops have been secured from all parts of the United States. What special machinery and scientific equipment is required is now in transit to these farms. Soon the late seeding will be started, guide boards put up explaining the work being carried on in each field, and as the crops appear above the ground these two farms will come into full operation.

The work on these two demonstration farms, however, is really only a minor part of the program to be carried out by the representatives of the Oregon Agricultural College in their endeavor to assist the farmers and new settlers of Crook County. The college authorities wish and are determined if it is in any way possible, to reach every farmer in the county who wishes assistance. The first step in this direction is to be taken immediately. This step is the establishment of co-operative fields in each important section of the county. These fields may be only from one-half an acre to five acres in size but if established in each of the important farming communities of the county, they will be the local center for the advisory and instructional work of the college experts. To get this co-operative work started at once it is desired that every farmer who is anxious to see some demonstration work in his neighborhood started and who will be willing to furnish the use of a couple of acres of ground and take care of it under the instruction of the college authorities, make this known at once by letter or in person to the superintendents of the demonstration farms.

Those located in the dry farming sections should address themselves to the superintendent of the college dry land demonstration farm at Metolius, and those located in the irrigated section should address themselves to Superintendent Powers of the college demonstration farm at Redmond. Make known to these superintendents what special problems in tillage or cropping your neighborhood is interested in, state that you are willing to devote a half acre or more of land lying adjacent to a main traveled road to demonstration work, and that you will furnish the tools and put in and take care of a certain amount of crop under the direction of the superintendents, describe the location of your land, and ask for a visit. A letter of this kind directed to either one of the superintendents of the demonstration farms will

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News Snapshots Of the Week

The White Star liner Titanic, the largest, fastest and most luxuriously appointed boat in the world, struck an iceberg when 600 miles off Cape Sable while on her maiden trip and sunk in less than two hours and a half. Of the 2,181 passengers and members of the crew only 705 were saved, having been picked up by the Cunard liner Carpathia after drifting about in open boats for hours. John Jacob Astor and Major A. W. Butt the president's aid, were among the notables who perished. Captain Smith went down with his ship. A senate committee met the Carpathia on her arrival in New York and began an investigation into the cause of the wreck. J. Bruce Ismay, head of the International Mercantile Marine, who was a passenger on the Titanic and was directing her maiden trip, was the chief witness.
