## Council Meeting Tuesday Evening

The city council met in regular session Tuesday evening. Present—Mayor Edwards; Councilmen Wianek, Ward, Noble, Cooper, Gray and Shipp, Marshal Coon and Recorder Bowman.

Councilman Ward of the Health and Police Committee reported that so far as he could learn the city had no authority to dump sewage in Ochoco creek.

Chairman Noble of the Street and Public Improvement Committee, recommended graveling the west end of Second Street and the north part of A Street.

Chairman Gray of the Fire and Water Committee reported that on making an investigation into the need of additional fire apparatus reported in favor of a chemical fire engine for the city.

The reports of the marshal, recorder and nightwatch were read and filed.

The city attorney reported that in his opinion the city had a good title to the west end of Third Street.

A petition from north side residents for a sidewalk was read and granted and walk ordered.  
Beginning at the northeast corner of block 2, Fifth addition to Prineville, on the west side of B Street, thence running south along the west side of B Street to the southeast corner of block 6, Second addition to Prineville, thence crossing B east to the southwest corner of block 5, Second addition, thence south along east side of B and along west side of blocks 4 and 3, Second addition, to the southwest corner of block 3, thence east along south side block 3, to connect with the present sidewalk on A, or Main Street.

Chairman Noble recommended that Main Street, north of the Ochoco bridge and Second Street west and the streets leading to the fair grounds be gravelled in the bad places. The matter was acted upon favorably by the council and the work was ordered done.
