The loss of the time roll and other records make the above segregation a matter of guess work in the main, as payment has been made to labor covering two or more different works. Provisions and supplies have been paid for, and I have charged to the amounts against the work in hand at the date of payment. There should have been filed also the invoices of all merchandise and provisions bought.

I find, also, that Mr. Roy Newell handled a part of the emergency road fund, and I have audited this account also, and have filed statement of same. He received warrants Nos. 544, 557, 567, 570, 589, 602, on the emergency road fund amounting to \$4,108 35. Cash subscription of \$350 00 from the citizens of Madras, donation work of Hay Creek Land Co. \$400 00, Jas. Rice \$150 00, L. L. Newell \$40 00, amounting in all to \$5,654 35.

That he expended as per his report to the county court for Sept. 1, 1911, and verified by signed vouchers Nos. 1 to 121, and also exhibited cancelled checks for the various amounts. Right of way \$ 255 80

That he returned to the treasurer by Warren Brown, to the credit of road fund \$ 100 00

And transferred the balance, \$94.11 to the credit of road district work, was accounted for in that work.

I will say in passing that a new system has been adopted by the county court in handling the emergency road fund whereby the moneys belonging to this fund is held by the county treasurer and all amounts of expenditures are paid direct by warrants drawn upon him. Thus a complete record is kept in his office of all such expenditures.

I would recommend that the persons making these expenditures keep safely and place on file with the county clerk all invoices and statements for materials purchased. Also all time rolls.

I would recommend that the sheriff, in entering their tax receipts into their collection register, use the column for the amount due the county fund. This will help to prevent many of the errors in giving wrong credits to special funds when making payments to treasurer.

Also that in filing bills against the high school fund, the itemized bill be presented as the claim.

And that all time rolls for work done on roads be preserved and filed with the reports. And an itemized bill for all supplies used on road work be demanded from whatever source obtained, and same be preserved for the files of the record.

I would recommend that all warrants issued upon any fund be made to order, instead of to bearer, as now.
