

Pathfinders See a Great Country

Bend, July 12.—The pathfinder cars left Bolter's ranch Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock and made over 100 miles during the day, obtaining a complete story of road conditions which will shortly be placed in book form for the benefit of the Portland business men who will make the Portland-Lakeview trip next month. Trout creek valley was soon left and after a steady climb to Gateway, on the Harriman line to Bend, the party entered the Agency Plains district, which extends some 12 miles north of Madras and west to the Deschutes river.

Six years ago this section was practically a sagebrush flat; today, as far as the eye can reach, it is practically one solid grain field. D. W. Barnett, secretary of the Madras Commercial Club, stated there was 60,000 acres of grain in the Agency Plains district that would harvest 30 bushels to the acre. Formerly it cost four-fifths of the crop to haul grain from here to Shaniko, but with both the Hill and Harriman systems within short hauling distance, the above acreage will be rapidly increased.

The party stopped at an attractive farm home owned by S. E. Binder, who originally came from Missouri and located his property six years ago. A little boy and girl took us through the orchard that would shame many in much more heralded parts of Oregon. There was everything in

The gospel of the Harriman demonstration train is taking wonderful effect in this section. Poultry and dairy cattle are fast assuming prominence. Since April 1, at which time the new creamery was established, over 500 head of Holstein and Jersey cattle have been brought in. The creamery is averaging from 2100 to 2500 pounds of butter a week, which is a fine showing in a community which six years ago was a sagebrush prairie. From Redmond the party came to Bend by way of Laidlaw and we left for Burns early Thursday morning.
